5. Student Support and Progression

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

IQAC generates awareness about the student support services extended by the institution to them. Following is the details of specific support services/facilities available for different categories of students.

Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:

SC/ST/OBC and economically weaker sections of society are given scholarships and fee concessions as per the government and university norms. These students are also given free books from the library for whole of the session. The remedial, entry level coaching and other classes are

also held for the students belonging to above categories. The UGC has also given grants during the eleventh plan for the above said activities to the college.

Students with physical disabilities:

The college is highly sensitive to the requirements of the physically challenged students. The physical facilities as per the requirements have been created in the institution and every care is taken to ensure that they do not face any hardship in the institution. The effort is also made to ensure that they remain emotionally upbeat in the institution under all the circumstances. Ramps at each entry steps are constructed for physically handicapped students. Proper facility is provided to physically challenged students, for accompanying them to the examination.

Students to participate in various competitions/National and International:

The students are encouraged to participate in National and International level competitions in the field of academics, sports and co-curricular activities. They are provided with travel facilities, boarding and lodging facilities, refreshment etc. as per the norms.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance, etc.:

The college provides professional medical services to its students and the staff. The physician is available for the whole week. Health talks and lectures on issues like nutrition, abuses of drugs, remedies of depression, stress and eating disorders etc are a regular feature. The college has a tie-up with the world class hospitals like Columbia Asia and Amar Hospital. Under which Health Insurance is provided to girls residing in the Hostel (75% of the charges are borne by the college and students has to pay only 25% expenses of the policy). First Aid Kit is available in the College Office and Gymnasium. Regular dental, cardiac, orthopedic and skin camps/checkups are organized for the wellness of the students. Free medical support is available during all the college events like sports, fests etc. from the hospital under MOUs. The institute has its own Ambulance in case of emergency to provide on the spot medical assistance.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams:

Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre organizes regular classes to prepare the students for competitive exams like UGC/NET. Soft skill workshops are also organized to enhance the communication skills of the students. The students are also trained for the competitive Banking exams.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.):

Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre organizes workshops, lectures and special classes to train students for group discussion, interviews and overall

personality development. Regularly students undergo training to excel in communication, computing and management skills etc.

Departments are also encouraged to organize class presentations, essay writing competitions, debates, quiz and book review sessions to enhance the spoken English/Punjabi skills, writing skills and presentation skills of the students.

Support for "slow learners":

Slow learners are provided with Personal counseling, Remedial coaching, extra classes, tests and assignments. Meetings with parents of slow learners are also regularly carried on. Student performance records are mailed to parents to keep them updated with the academic performance of their ward.

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/ business house, etc.

Experts from industry and corporate houses are invited as guest speaker to interact with students. Students visit various business/corporate/industrial houses to study and to understand the working/processing of these houses. Further students also enroll themselves with these to undertake their summer projects.

Publication of student magazines:

The students are encouraged to exhibit their talent/hidden potentialities through their writings in 'The Patiala', an annual college magazine. The college owns independent publication cell that promotes the writing skills of the students. Department of Computer Science department published the magazine "Computonics Times" with the innovative advancements in IT field by the students.

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

The data of undergraduate students who progress to post graduate programmes of the college is available and maintained.

The institute has effective mechanism for tracking the progress of its academic, administrative process.

The staff council keeps a keen eye on the activities of the institution. Suggestions are made to the Principal for improvement of academics, infrastructure, student-concerns through various meetings with the head of the institute. Staff meetings, co-ordinators of various classes, provide regular update to the concerned authorities to plug in loopholes if any. A yearly assessment of the previous sessions gives clear direction as to what is required to make further improvements. The annual report facilities the transparent review of the progress made in the academic year.

5.8 Details of gender sensitization programmes

The college makes every effort to sensitize its staff and students on the very crucial issues such as gender, inclusion, environment, human rights etc. by giving a clear cut focus on them. The role played by the institution in this direction is described as under:

The college is managed by SGPC, Sri Amritsar, the apex body of Sikhs and it's a specific direction of the college management to establish a *Nanhi Chaan Cell* in the college and to have special efforts for the girl education. The efforts made in this direction are as under:

Gender issues:

- The first Sikh Guru, Guru Nanak Dev ji preaches the humankind that there should not be any discrimination on the basis of gender and women must be given high respect. The Guru says "From woman, man is born; within woman, man is conceived; to woman he is engaged and married. Woman becomes his friend; through woman, the future generations come. When his woman dies, he seeks another woman; to woman he bound. So why call her bad? From her, kings are born. From woman, woman is born; without woman there would be no one at all".
- During the last decade of twentieth century, the development of communication technology has put forth India's image in such a way that a number of questions have been raised about our rich heritage and diverse culture. There is no doubt about it that one cannot be proud of every aspect of its culture. Indian lifestyle also has certain shortcomings, for example gender inequality, racial and caste demarcations and above all, the social and economic status consequently. Such distortive thinking and discriminations create a feeling of insecurity among the girls. The present era is the time to transform the image of woman from passive and victimised to that of self reliant and self aware woman. It is the time to make them strong and confident enough to face the challenges of developing world. We realised this only after going through the painful and daily life experiences penned down by the girl students for our book 'MERI KAHANI MERI JUBANI' (MY STORY IN MY WORDS) After reading their experience we felt that women of today have courage and strength but the thing they only lack is proper knowledge and awareness. There is an urgent need to spread awareness among girls to realise their potential and to assert their identity.
- Khalsa College, Patiala, is playing a significant role in creating social awareness against
 injustice and marginalization of the females through various awareness activities like
 seminars, drives, campaigns. The college has established NANNI CHAAN CELL in

2009. The cell has constantly highlighted issues like gender inequality, female foeticide, education among the students and society at large.

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As college has attained Autonomous status, various board of studies meetings were held with renowned academicians. The valuable suggestions were given by them for curriculum development and CBCS curriculum pattern opted for undergraduate courses.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Besides regular teaching and learning, a few practices are followed to make it effective. Remedial classes are held for slow students, booster classes are held for advance learners. Special classes for communication skills, conversational skills, soft skills and analytical skills are held to make students ready for interviews. Coaching classes for competitive exams are organised. Mock interviews and role plays are held to prepare students to appear for their practical examination. Educational tours are undertaken by all departments to give the students practical exposure. Many departments show case movies

to students to help in their studies. Literary societies organise stage dramas, one act plays, debate and elocution competitions to improve the personality of students.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Two mid semesters tests are held in each semester to prepare students for final examination. The students of annual examination appear for a house test. These tests are mandatory for all students. The results give the teacher an idea about their performance. Answer sheets are evaluated with utmost care and are discussed with the students. The students are allowed to take the evaluated answer sheets to their homes.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- The faculty is actively engaged in research. Many of the faculty members are working on major and minor research projects. Some faculty members have been granted patents for their experiments. The institution encourages faculty to participate and present research papers in National and International conferences and seminars. Post graduate students are made to present research papers in seminars and their teachers assist them in preparing their research papers.

• The institution updates library, ICT and physical infrastructure instruments every year. The library has been fully automated. The library committee meets every month to evaluate the working of the library and gives suggestions for making it more student and user friendly. The institution provides full support to the department for the extensive usage of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students. The institution conducts workshops to train the staff to make best use of ICT resources. Students are also encouraged to use these tools in giving their class presentations and seminars.

Suitable candidates are selected. Orientation courses are arranged to orient the new faculty members towards the working of the college. Every effort is made to maintain and retain the faculty.
- The institution motivates the faculty members to upgrade themselves constantly. With
 this aim they are sent to participate and present research papers in National and
 International conference and seminars. They are given financial assistance also to
 serve the purpose. The institution organises conferences, seminars itself which gives a
 healthy exposure to faculty as well as students.

6.9 What efforts are made by the University/ Autonomous College for Examination Reforms?

The college has a independent Examination Branch. It is completely computerized. The results are declared online and every student has his/her unique Id. The date sheet and information regarding the exams is disseminated to the students through the college website and other social media groups.

Almabay, an online mobile application, was launched in the session 2016-17 by the Old Students Association of the college. It is an online virtual platform which serves the dual purpose of connecting the old and the present students of the college and also availing them of many job opportunities as per their academic and non-academic profile. Through this application the alumni of the college can be rooted with their institution and at the same time provide mentorship to the existing students by signing up to this site. Initially four students of the college were appointed as the campus brand Ambassador for Almabay who were later assisted by many other students to spread the word about this online platform in the college. Also, the students of the outgoing classes are encouraged the most to get themselves enrolled with this application and make the optimum use of the services provided by it.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

Two PTA meetings were organised in the session 2016-17. First one was organised on 14th October, 2016 and the second meeting took place on 30th March, 2017. The agenda of both the meetings was to apprise parents about the attendance status of their wards and about the result of MSTs. Parents were also informed about the various clubs, wing, societies and cells and their activities happening in the college. They were also told about the remedial classes and doubt classes being run in the college. The parents visited the teachers in their departments and gathered valuable information about the progress of their wards.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

The institution organises various development programmes for support staff so that they can handle the latest equipment, for example, the library staff were given training to handle automated library.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly

The college adheres to the guidelines put forward by the Ministry of Environment and Forests, Government of India for inculcating environment consciousness in the society. Energy Conservation

Along with the academic activities, the institute is constantly working to make the campus environment friendly. Efforts are made to make the most of the energy provided by Mother Nature. The rainwater is directed to low lying areas/agricultural fields of the college so that it may percolate the earth. Use of Renewable Energy

To use the most of the renewable energy the classrooms are designed to have maximum number of windows, to ensure the maximum day light and air during the day. Similarly, by using Solar lights in the campus, electricity consumption is reduced and also the carbon footprints.

Water Harvesting

In order to save the precious water, the agriculture department of the college is actively working on this issue. The rain water and the tap water are directed to the experimental field lands and different flower beds in the college.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

The college works on the principle of sustainable use of environment. The Stationery items are send to paper industry and the use of recycled paper is always encouraged. Plantation drives are organized under NSS and Youth Club of the college. The chemistry department organizes the Anti Cracker Rally under the banner of Green Chemistry Club of the college to reduce both the air and sound pollution. Use of technology is encouraged to save the paper and reduce carbon footprints and message is sent through emails and SMS through mobiles. The construction department is encouraged to buy and use A-rated electrical appliances. The college office uses double side paper printing, if required. Similarly, environment related educational programmes are organized by NSS to spread eco-sensibility.

Hazardous waste management

College manages the hazardous waste like chemicals, oils, pesticides, cleaners. Each type of waste is collected in different containers and is disposed accordingly so that it may not contaminate the environment and increase the carbon footprints.

E-waste management


