- 4. Staff council, departmental and staff meetings are conducted from time to time to discuss the academic plans and matters.
- 5. The academic time table is drawn keeping in view the convenience of the students. A suggestion box for the students has been put up in the college to get their feedback. The students are also encouraged to interact with the faculty members regarding their academic issues and problems. The teacher incharges of the different classes have been instructed to frequently interact with the representatives of different classes in order to take stock of the issues of the respective classes and then to resolve the same.
- 6. The teachers are encouraged to use ICT tools for the effective implementation of the curriculum. Most of the class rooms are equipped with LCD/LED projectors and all the departments have sufficient number of laptops.
- 7. In order to impart the conceptual understanding of the subject, the Question Bank with Answers, prepared by the faculty members for each subject, is available on the college website. The students are encouraged to develop the conceptual clarity of their relevant subjects.
- 8. The students are encouraged to take part in various workshops, industrial visits, educational tours, field trainings and projects in order to enable them to get practical exposure of the curriculum they follow.
- 9. Remedial classes are held for the academically weak and special classes are held for brilliant students.
- 10. UGC Networking Resource Centre is made available to the faculty members so that they can get the e-knowledge resources available on various resource centres.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The college administration provides state-of-the-art infrastructural facilities, academic resources and unstinted support to the teachers for effectively translating the curriculum and improving their teaching practices. More specifically, they are provided the support as under:

- 1. The library of the college has extensive and varied collection of books, journals and magazines. This collection is augmented on regular basis. The information regarding books is available on WEBOPAC and the same can be explored on the touch screens available in the library and through internet also. The teachers regularly visit the library and use its resources for the purpose of their teaching and enhancement of their knowledge. The teachers are also encouraged to read the books beyond their syllabus so that they can deliver better knowledge to their students. The college also possesses the e-library facility from INFLIBNET.
- 2. Most of the class rooms are fully equipped with latest pedagogical requirements like LED's, laptops, digital visualizers etc. Most of the teachers use these facilities to make their teaching effective and interesting. The college campus is completely Wi-Fi enabled and teachers are given free access to use internet as per their requirement and convenience to augment their subject knowledge.
- 3. Teachers are encouraged, motivated and sponsored for participation in National and International Conference, Seminars and Workshops. They are also encouraged to involve in various research activities and as a result many of the teachers are doing or have done minor and major research projects of UGC. Teachers are also sent for various short term courses, orientation courses and refresher courses.
- 4. Teachers conduct monthly and other periodic tests of the students for their evaluation and they devise strategies for the improvement in the performance of their students.
- 5. The college organizes various industrial visits, field visits and visits to other oganisations like banks, museums etc. to give the practical exposure to students as well as the teachers. For example the students of Master of

Leadership Development visited the session of Vidhan Sabha to watch the leaders in action.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other Statutory agency.

- 1. Keeping pace with modern times, the college has added many smart class rooms to its infrastructure. The class rooms are well lit, airy and spacious. They are fully equipped with the electronic gadgets of the time.
- 2. The soft skills lab has technological facilities for the improvement of students in their communication skills in English. It also helps students to get structured practice sessions, evaluations and comparisons thereby making language learning more interesting, effective and meaningful.
- 3. The college has state-of-the-art computer and science labs which are fully equipped with the advanced electronic gadgets and sophisticated equipments.
- 4. Academic planning and its execution is effectively ensured by the college.
- 5. Library resources are regularly updated and augmented as per the needs of the students and the teachers.
- 6. The participation of the students in the workshops, seminars and practical assignments is always ensured and they are encouraged to apply the theory into practice. For example the Department of English and Foreign Languages frequently organizes functions like Poetry in action, Literature through colours, Role playing, Enactment of English plays, Storytelling and the like.
- 7. Departmental workshops, State level and National level seminars and extension lectures are also conducted regularly in the college.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The college has set up Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counseling and Placement Center to network and interact with the Industry. The centre functions with the primary objective of making students employable and then focusing on getting them placed in reputed companies and organizations. The interaction with different beneficiaries is ensured as under:

- 1. Students are regularly sent to various industrial visits in order to give them the practical exposure and learning.
- 2. Experts from industry, professional bodies, research organizations and different universities are frequently invited to interact with the students in order to expose them to the changing external environment.
- 3. The college invites various companies and organizations for placement of its students every year.
- 4. Students are exposed to various research projects, festivals and fairs organized in the different universities and research institutions. For example, the students of Department of Agriculture regularly visit Punjab Agriculture University to experience the latest know how. Students of Functional English are taken to Doordarshan and Radio programmes.
- 5. Many of the faculty members of the institution are members of different bodies of the university like Board of Studies, Faculties and Senate. Some of them are supervising the M.Phil and Ph.D students of the affiliating university and other universities also.
- 6. The college has tied up with organizations and companies for UGC sponsored programmes like B.Voc. in Food Processing & Engineering, Software Development, Community College in Green House Technology and Auto Electricals & Electronics.
- 7. Some of our faculty members are providing consultancy to industrial houses and other organizations.

- 2. The college started innovative course of Master of Leadership Development which was approved by UGC. The syllabus of this course was designed by the faculty of Commerce and Management Department and it was approved by the board of studies of university after minor changes. Similarly, the syllabi of new courses started for the first time in the college and in the university like BA Professional, B.Com. Professional, B.Com. Accounting and Finance, Diploma in BPO and PG Diploma in Business Journalism were also designed by the faculty members of the college and the same were approved by the concerned board of studies of the university.
- 3. The institution is of the view that the students must study the time and market relevant curriculum in order to get placements in different sectors of the economy. Keeping this important factor in mind, the faculty members keenly observe the happening in the academic scenario of the globe and resulting output is used in the designing and framing of new professional courses in the institution.

- 4. The institution regularly invites feedback from the students and the faculty regarding the curriculum contents. IQAC of the institution also plays a proactive role in receiving the feedback in this direction. The feedback so received is taken care of by the faculty members representing the board of studies/faculty of the university.
- 5. The college has started UGC approved and sponsored new courses of B.Voc. in Software Development and Food Processing & Engineering, Community College in Green House Technology and Auto Electrical & Electronics and the syllabus of all these courses have been designed by the faculty members of the college in consultation with industry.
- 6. Conscious efforts are also made to get the feedback for the curriculum from different stakeholders like Alumni, Parents, Employers/Industry and academic peers and experts.

The university does not allow any autonomy to the institution for starting any course without its permission. The curriculum for any course to be started in the institution must be approved by the concerned board of studies of the university. However, the institution developed curriculum for its programs like Master of Leadership Development, B.Com (Professional), B.Com (Accounting and Finance), BA (Professional), B.Voc. Software Development, B.Voc. Food Processing & Engineering and UGC Add-on courses like Punjabi Journalism and Translation Proficiency and the same were approved by the university with slight modifications.

The college has been granted community college in Green House Technology and Auto Electrical & Electronics. For this purpose the college has its Board of Studies and syllabus has been designed by the college itself.

The institution ensures the effective implementation of the curriculum and tries its level best to achieve the very objectives of the curriculum. It is ensured as under:

- 1. The faculty members leave no stone unturned to develop the interest of the students in their respective courses. They apprise them of the various opportunities and avenues in the subjects/courses they have opted.
- 2. It is ensured that the theoretical/conceptual knowledge must be supplemented with the practical knowledge. For this purpose, various workshops, seminars, industrial visits, lab practical and educational tours are frequently organized. Mock interviews, Mock viva, group discussions etc. are also conducted to evaluate the level of understanding of the students.
- 3. Regular feedback from students is ensured.

The teachers are appointed on merit basis by following the UGC/Punjabi University Patiala/Punjab Government norms and their qualification and grade is on the basis of same norms. Salary for regular staff is as per UGC norms and for adhoc staff it is as per the policy of SGPC, Sri Amritsar, the governing body of the institution.

These programmes are different from other programmes in their emphasis on practical training of the students. The students are made to interact with experts who give them exposure and they can practically implement the ideas. In these courses the students are sent to various industrial/educational tours and training programmes. Most of these programmes are job oriented, time and market relevant and make them globally competent and socially relevant. The courses like B.Com. Professional, B.Com Accounting and Finance and B.A. Professional are totally focused on the practical implementation of contents of the curriculum. Similarly the Bachelor of Vocation courses and Community College courses are totally focused on preparing the students for their respective vocation. The admission to these courses is on merit basis and the students prefer these courses over the conventional courses.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The goal of the college is to impart holistic education, aiming to make the students time and market relevant, globally competent, morally upright and socially responsible citizens. The institution has been making unstinted efforts to ensure an optimum alignment between academic programmes and its goals. The

institution has started 28 new programmes/courses in the last five years and the very purpose of these courses is not only to impart knowledge and the degree to students but to transform them into work ready force for the global market. A conscious effort has always been made that the students have a global vision by keeping the local values and culture intact. UGC, the apex body of higher education of the country, approved an innovative course of Master of Leadership Development to the institution which was exclusively designed by the institution keeping the mission of the college in mind. Similarly, UGC has also approved Bachelor of Vocation and Community College to the institution.

The college introduced many new courses which were approved and acknowledged by the university authorities lauding the initiatives taken by the college in enriching and organizing the curriculum to make it relevant for the dynamic employment market. These courses include Master of Leadership Development, B.A. Professional, B.Com. Accounting and Finance, B.Com. Professional and One year Intensive Diploma in French. Our college took the lead while voicing our vote for changing examination system from annual into semester system. Every year the institution asks for feedback from the students regarding their aspirations and demands from the institution. For example, our B.Com. general students were of the view that even after completing their graduation in commerce, they were not in a position even to write a cash book of their small business. Keeping this experience of the students in mind, the college started B.Com. Professional, B.Com. Accounting and Finance and Add on courses on Computerized Accounting so that the students can be practically trained in the relevant subject.

Similarly, B.Voc. (Food Processing and Engineering), B.Voc. (Software Development), Advance Diploma in Green House Technology, Advance Diploma in Auto Electricals & Electronics have been introduced from the current session (2014-15) on the basis of recommendation of Ministry of Human Resource and Development (MHRD), Government of India and policy of National Skill Development. UGC has granted skill based courses catering to the needs of the

society. In view of the above, the curriculum of the courses has been designed which will fill the gap between the conventional education system and market requirements. The curriculum has 70% focus on practical training and 30% on theoretical training, which will make students job ready right after completing the programme.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The institution tries its best to integrate the above mentioned cross cutting issues in the curriculum by giving a clear cut focus on them. The role played by the institution in this direction is described as under:

Gender issues:

The first Sikh Guru, Guru Nanak Dev ji preaches the humankind that there should not be any discrimination on the basis of gender and women must be given high respect. The Guru says "From woman, man is born; within woman, man is conceived; to woman he is engaged and married. Woman becomes his friend; through woman, the future generations come. When his woman dies, he seeks another woman; to woman he bound. So why call her bad? From her, kings are born. From woman, woman is born; without woman there would be no one at all".

The college is managed by SGPC, Sri Amritsar, the apex body of Sikhs and it's a specific direction of the college management to establish a *Nanhi Chaan Cell* in the college and to have special efforts for the girl education. The efforts made in this direction are as under:

- 1. The college organized a UGC sponsored National conference on Indian Women: Position and Perspective.
- 2. The college organized ICSSR sponsored seminar on "Women and Crime : Problem and Remedy".
- 3. The college celebrates International Women Day every year and enlightens the society about women related issues.
- 4. The publication cell of college has published 2 books specifically on women issues. The first was on the poetry composed about women by different Punjabi poets and the second was a book of articles on different women issues.

- 5. The college constructed a girls hostel where 234 girls are residing from different parts of the country.
- 6. The college introduced 5 awards of excellence to be given each year for the girl students of the college to promote girl education.
- 7. The college organizes *girls meet* every year to make them aware about their rights, education and other issues.
- 8. The *Nanhi Chaan Cell* of the institution organizes many programmes on women empowerment, gender equality and health issues.
- 9. Every year the famous Indian festival Lohri is dedicated to girls and they ignite the pious ceremony of lighting the *Lohri*.
- 10. The college celebrates every year the *Teej* festival with great fervour.
- 11. The college has started to publish a annual magazine of the hostel dedicated to the girls named *Dhian* (Daughters).
- 12. The college launched a campaign among the boy students to go for dowry free marriage.
- 13. The growing number of the girls students in the college is a testimony to the fact that the environment in the college is safe, secure and serene for girl education.

Climate Change and Environment Education:

The institution organizes various programmes for the preservation and protection of environment. The following programmes are worth mentioning in this context:

- 1. The college celebrates the birthday of seventh Sikh Master, Guru Har Rai Ji as the Environment Day and plants saplings on this auspicious day.
- The institution has PTA rose garden, Botanical garden and land specifically
 marked for growing organic food. The college makes special efforts for solid
 waste management, waste water management, biological waste disposal and
 water harvesting.
- 3. The college organized an interfaith UGC sponsored National conference on Environment Management where the spiritual scholars and faith leaders across the country participated in it.
- 4. The publication cell of the college published a book titled "Environmental Issues: Spiritual Solutions".

- 5. The college organizes various competitions like poster making, declamation, slogan writing to create awareness about the environmental issues.
- 6. The Green Chem Club of the institution oganises rallies to spread awareness among students and celebrates Eco-safe green Diwali every year.
- 7. Punjabi University Patiala has made it mandatory for every undergraduate student to pass the compulsory paper of Environment Studies.
- 8. NSS, NCC, Youth Club, Environment Club and other Societies of the college involve student in various activities for environmental sensitization.

Human Rights:

The institution has Legal Literacy Cell for spreading awareness about various issues including human rights concerning the society. Students and faculty members are made aware about the human rights through the lectures and interactions with them. The institution is located in a city of Patiala which was blessed by the Ninth Sikh Master Guru Teg Bahadur, who laid down his life for the protection of the rights and faiths of the people of a religion that he did not profess. The institution makes conscious efforts to protect and preserve the human rights and at the same time ensures that no violation of any kind may take place in the institution.

ICT:

The institution makes every effort to ensure the use of ICT in learning and teaching. It can be revealed as under:

- Most of the class rooms/labs of the institution are equipped with LED projectors and laptop facilities. The teachers make use of these facilities in their teaching.
- 2. The institution has 237 computers including laptop of latest technology in its various computer labs and other departments
- 3. Computer and internet facility is available in all the departmental rooms.
- 4. The total college campus is Wi-Fi enabled.
- 5. Special short term courses are organized for the students, faculty and non-teaching staff about different aspects of computer and ICT.

- 6. College library, Accounts department, Examination Department and other establishment are fully computerized.
- 7. College website is highly dynamic and is regularly updated. The students and other stakeholders are provided variety of useful information through this website. The conceptual Data Bank of different subjects has been provided on the website for the conceptual understanding of the subject by the students.
- 8. The students are also shown different movies, presentations and other educational contents to supplement their class room learning. They are also given exposure about on-line testing in order to make them technology savvy
- 9. The college has ICT enabled seminar hall and language lab.
- 10. The college also posses latest IT gadgets like Power podium, Touch screen Kiosk, Digital visualizer, Interactive all-in-one projectors, Multimedia LCD/LED projectors, E-book reader, all-in-one computers and printers.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

The various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered by the institution for the holistic development of students are as follows:

1. Moral and Ethical Values

To fulfill the college mission of creating morally upright and socially responsible citizen, the institution provides conducive environment to its students. In its pursuits to provide holistic education to the students along with providing academic and professional excellence, a conscious effort is made to ingrain ethical and moral values in them. In this connection following initiative are taken by the college:

1. The college boasts of a Gurdwara Sahib, which is a spiritual abode for providing us spiritual and moral strength. Various religious functions are held in Gurdwara Sahib with the active participation of students in inculcating religious, moral and ethical values in them. The students take part in the preparation of the food (*Langar*) to be served on the occasion of various religious programme. Every month *Sangrand* (New month as per Indian Calendar) is celebrated and students are addressed about the ethical and moral values.

- The college strictly prohibits the psychological or emotional exploitation of students. The Anti-Ragging Cell acts as watchdog against such unlawful activities and till date no case of ragging has been reported in the college campus or hostel.
- 3. To sensitize students on various social issues against injustice and marginalization of the female, *Nanhi Chann Cell* of the college organizes activities like seminars, drives, campaigns.
- 4. The Goodwill Cell engages in various fund raising activities to contribute towards various causes to help the under privileged sections of the society.
- 5. NSS, NCC, Youth Club and Red Cross Committee of the college organizes blood donation camps, seminars and lectures on issues like drug abuse etc. to inculcate the values of stewardship.
- 6. Various departmental associations involve students in activities like celebrating Diwali with inmates of Old Age Homes, Children's Day with street children etc.
- 7. NSS units of the college tries to develop the dignity of labour and social responsibility among the students.
- 8. PTA organized a campaign where college Principal administered oath to the students to respect parents for a peaceful life and brochures were distributed among the students.
- 9. Use of all kinds of intoxicants is strictly prohibited in the college campus.

2. Employable, life skills and better career options:

- Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counseling and Placement Centre of the college functions with the primary objective of making students employable, and then focusing on getting them placed in reputed companies and organizations.
- 2. To impart employability skills to the students, the centre is engaged in training them regularly on various modules that make them enter and then adept to the organization. The training modules cover aptitude tests, group discussions, interview techniques, self-motivation, stress management and a host of other need based skills for the students. Both in-house and professional external faculty is involved and efforts are made to hone the overall personality of the students.

- 3. The centre strives to open frontiers of knowledge and reveal new horizons of change, to broaden mindsets and to create positive attitude in the students by organizing lectures, workshops, seminars and group interactions.
- 4. The students get a lot of industrial exposure through their frequent industrial visits. Special classes are arranged for SC/ST, minority students and all those students who require special attention.
- 5. Workshop and Seminars are also held for the teaching and non-teaching faculty members to brush up their knowledge and skills.
- 6. The soft skill lab of the college aims to improve communication skills in English. It facilitates a broad range of activities that involve students in reading, writing, listening and speaking the target language.
- 7. Personality development programmes and other life skill activities like self awareness sessions, negotiation skills, life etiquette learning programmes and body language learning techniques are frequently conducted in the classes along with regular curriculum.

3. Community Orientation

The various societies, units and cells of the college ensure pro-active participation of the students in various community oriented activities and programmes. NSS, NCC, Nanhi Chaan Cell, PTA, Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counseling and Placement Centre, Gurmat Society, Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Population Club and Literary Societies of the college undertake such programmes as inculcate those values among students which encourage them to subordinate their individual interest for the common interest. The students are motivated to participate in social service activities, campaigns against various social evils and activities undertaken for the protection and preservation of environment. A number of extension lectures are conducted to make them aware of their rights and duties towards the community like voting rights, legal rights etc. and they are encouraged to participate actively within their communities. Special arrangements are made for the students to visit museum & art galleries and libraries.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

- Annually IQAC collects the feedback from outgoing student regarding their views about present curriculum and on the basis of such feedback the college introduced the course like M.Sc. Physics, M.Sc. Chemistry, M.Sc. Mathematics, M.Com, M.A. Music Vocal, M.Sc. Agriculture, Diploma in Urdu and Sanskrit.
- 2. The Principal, college council and staff interact with the students in organized groups to take the feedback from the students regarding the course content and subject options. On the basis of such interactions many new elective subject were introduced in B.A. programme like Psychology, Defense and Strategic Studies, Gurmat Sangeet and Add-on courses like Tourism, Fashion Designing, Punjabi Journalism and Computerized Accounting.
- 3. The college organizes frequently meetings with renowned academicians and eminent personalities from corporate, industrial, banking and other sectors to take their views on quality of intake they require. On the basis of such information the college started practical oriented courses like B.Com. Professional, B.Com. Accounting and Finance, B.A. Professional and Innovative Course Master of Leadership Development.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

- 1. IQAC of the college through feedback from the faculty and students monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes.
- Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counseling and Placement Centre keeps a
 record of the achievements of the students in terms of their placement and
 further studies.
- 3. The academic results and other achievements of the students are monitored and evaluated by the Examination Branch of the college as well as the records of important achievement are also kept by the concerned departments.
- 4. Principal of the college through departmental meetings, faculty meetings and meeting with the students keeps a close vigil on the qualitative output of the enrichment programmes of the college.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The institution contributes to the development of the curriculum by the active participation of its faculty in different boards of studies of the affiliating university. Although, university does not allow any freedom to its affiliated colleges for the design and development of curriculum, yet the institution took a major initiative in the professionalization of courses in the university by proposing new courses like B.Com. Professional, B.Com. Accounting and Finance, B.A. Professional and Master of Leadership Development. Similarly, B.Voc. courses and community college courses have been started by the college which have approved by the UGC. The syllabi of these courses was totally framed and designed by the college faculty and the same was got approved from the respective board of studies of the university with slight modifications. The Dean Colleges, Punjabi University, Patiala appreciated these efforts of the college in his write-up in National Newspaper.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes, the feedback is taken from students regarding curriculum through a questionnaire and interactive meetings. Other stakeholders of the society are also consulted as and when required to get their feedback about the curriculum enrichment. The college also organized a National Conference on Emerging Paradigms in Commerce and Management Education in order to bring an overall change that need to be incorporated in the curriculum in order to make the current day education time and market relevant and the same was brought in book form and was presented to university authorities for implementation.

These programmes are different from other programmes in their emphasis on practical training of the students. The students are made to interact with experts who give them exposure and they can practically implement the ideas. In these courses the students are sent to various industrial/educational tours and training programmes. Most of these programmes are job oriented, time and market relevant and make them globally competent and social relevant. More specifically the courses like B.Voc. Software Development, B.Voc. Food Processing and Engineering, Advanced Diploma in Green House Technology and Advanced Diploma in Auto Electrical and Electronics are totally focused on the practical implementation of contents of the curriculum.

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

The College is among the front runners in Punjabi University Patiala in the matter of initiating new time, market and society relevant courses. The faculty members of the institution make unstinted efforts with the help of their creativity and imagination to incorporate innovative ideas and concepts at the time of designing and implementing the curriculum of different subjects and streams. Though the college does not enjoy complete freedom in the designing of the syllabus, yet the active participation of the faculty members is sought by the affiliating university. As far as the innovative and vocational and add-on courses of UGC are concerned the whole exercise regarding the framing the curriculum has done by the faculty members of the institution itself. The conscious effort is made to have an optimum blend of theory and practical in the curriculum of various classes. It is also ensured that teachers go beyond the syllabi so that the students can be equipped with not only the contents of the curriculum but everything else which comes in the broader ambit of that area. The total curriculum is supplemented with the workshops, educational trips, field visits, industrial exposure and motivational interactions.

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION



2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college follows an open and highly transparent admission process. It is ensured that the information relating to the courses run by the college and its admission criteria reaches the public at large. The process and means followed for publicity is as under:

- Advertisements: The College inserts advertisements regarding admission notice every year in the vernacular and national newspapers. The advertisements are also given to certain online newspapers. These are also displayed on cable TV. Flex boards are installed at different places in the city. The leaflets and pamphlets containing the admission information are also circulated through the newspapers.
- 2. **College Website:** The College website is highly dynamic and is constantly updated. Admission notice, admission guidelines and other rules and regulations are uploaded on the college website. It is worth mentioning that this website is frequently used by the users.
- 3. College Prospectus: College Prospectus is a detailed document which contains all the rules and regulations of the admission process. It is printed well in advance and is also uploaded on the college website. The students can get each and every detail regarding the admission by going through the contents of the prospectus.
- 4. **Word of Mouth Publicity:** The satisfied stakeholder of the college is the best source of publicity and our rising graph of admissions is an ample proof that the college is producing a satisfied lot of students who ultimately bring in more students to the institution.
- College and Course Brochure: Brochures of certain courses are also prepared and the same are distributed among the prevailing students so that they can know about their future course of education after completing their one terminal.

Transparency is ensured in the admission process. Admission policy is made public through the advertisements, college prospectus and college website. The cut-off marks are displayed for those courses where the number of admission seekers is high and seats are limited. Admission is made on merit basis.

Admission Committees are constituted every year for different classes and the senior most faculty member in the committee acts as the convener of the committee. These committees not only help the prospective students in filling the admission forms but also guide and counsel them in the choice of their course or subject. A special facility is given to the students for filling in the online forms in the computer labs of the college under the supervision of the experts.

Before the start of the admission process, the help desk is created in the college during the vacations which is manned by the experts of different faculties. They guide and goad the admission seekers about the very choice of career.

Admission is strictly made on merit and as per the rules and regulations of the affiliating university. The admission norms and policy is never violated and the grievances/suggestions of the admission seekers are taken care of by the admission committee members.

Admission committee recommends student for admission and the final admission is approved the Principal or the person deputed by the Principal for the same.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The students are asked to submit the admission forms by particular date, which is mentioned in the prospectus. They are asked to appear for their interview before the admission committee and the Principal/his nominee. The admission to those courses is made strictly on merit basis where the number of admission seekers is more than the seats. However where the number is less, a minimum percentage is

fixed for admission and the students below that percentage are not considered for admission. The cut-off marks are also displayed on the college website. The seats remain vacant after the first counseling, are filled through subsequent counselings or first cum first serve basis. There are no entrance tests for admission to any class. Personal interviews play an important role for the selection of candidates for various courses.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

Minimum percentage of marks is determined by the board/university for different classes. Maximum marks vary from class to class, from categories to category and from time to time. The detailed analysis of each course is as under:

The above table clearly signifies that the students with good percentage in their entry level class prefer to join GSSDGS Khalsa College, Patiala for their further studies. It is also reflected that the two prominent colleges in the vicinity of the college (One being rural college, other urban college) offer very less number of courses in comparison to the host college. Moreover, the college being innovative and leader in education in the area started those courses which are not run in the surrounding areas and hence no comparison can be made for those courses.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, the college makes a detailed analysis of the admissions every year with the academic council and heads of the departments. The gaps, if any, are found and efforts are made to plug in the gaps. For example, it came to the notice to college administration that the students from the other states and far away cities find it difficult to visit the institution at the time of filling in the application form or to get the prospectus. As a result the college prospectus was uploaded on the website and the facility of online form submission was given to the applicants. They were asked to appear for the interview directly and given the facility to submit the hard copy of the application form and the required fee at that time. It created convenience for the student. Efforts will be made to attract the students from other

states like J&K, HP and Haryana. The resultant outcome was that the number of students from those states rose considerably.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion of SC/ST, OBC, Women, Differently abled, Economically weaker sections, Minority community, Any other

The admission policy of the college is set as per the rules and regulations laid by the State Government and affiliating University. The seats are reserved for SC/ST, as per the State Government/Punjabi University, Patiala norms. Eligibility criteria for SC/ST/OBC is set at 5% less than for the other categories as per the specified norms. Those SC/ST/OBC students who produce necessary documents, get admission with no fees as the same is claimed later by them from the centre government. Other than this, to make education facility available to all the categories and to bring diversity, the college gives concessions to SC/ST, OBC, Economically weak students. Remedial and coaching classes are held to facilitate the learning. They are provided free books.

The college is very particular about the differently-abled, unprivileged, down trodden and economically deprived sections the society. Various types of scholarships and fee-concessions are given to the students belonging to these categories. It is ensured that no student whoever has applied for admission is never deprived of admission because of the monetary factors. The Goodwill Cell, various departmental associations and faculty members contribute magnanimously for this purpose. The following table clearly reflects the diversity of the students who have got admission in the college:

The college has seen an impressive growth in the admissions during the last four years. The number of students has almost gone up three times as compared to the number in 2009. The number of admission seekers has also increased in a similar manner. The demand ratio has been in the increasing trend for the most of the courses and programmes run by the college. The reason of growth is the better commitment and dedication of the faculty members, better results, better facilities and infrastructure, availability of better career options, better discipline and better image projection of the institution in the society. However for some of the courses there is overall decrease in the trend throughout the state. The institution has opted for time-relevant alternative courses for example: The college introduced B.Voc. (Software Development) to make up for the deficiency in BCA.

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution is sensitive towards differently-abled students. It ensures that

proper care should be given to them. Ramps have been built in the college as well as in the hostel at required places. The seating arrangements of such students are made at the ground floor during the classes as well during the examination. The government policies regarding reservation in admission and maintenance of other standards are adhered to.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the needs of the students regarding their knowledge and skill level are ascertained before the commencement of the programme during the initial interactive and orientation classes. Some special classes are organized for the students so that they can make up their deficiency in that particular subject or course in order to bring them at par with other students of the same class. For example, Post graduation in English can be pursued by the students who did not study English literature in BA program. Such students find it difficult to understand the history of literature. The Faculty advises such students about relevant books to make up for the loss.

Remedial classes, classes for weak and intelligent students and classes to improve the communication and soft skills, reasoning skills, analytical skills of students are also held every year. The college has established Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre to effectively ensure the implementation of knowledge and skill development programme.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.

The institution conducts bridge and remedial courses every year to minimize the knowledge gap of the enrolled students so that they can be in a position to successfully pursue the programme of their choice. Many enrichment programmes like personality development courses, communication and soft skill development programmes, computer and IT related courses, analytical skill development courses, cooking and other house hold activity related courses are also conducted on a regular basis in the institution. The institution also runs Add-on courses in

Translation Proficiency, Tourism, Computerised Accounting, Fashion Designing and Punjabi Journalism.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college makes every effort to sensitize its staff and students on the very crucial issues such as gender, inclusion, environment, human rights etc. by giving a clear cut focus on them. The role played by the institution in this direction is described as under:

Gender issues:

The first Sikh Guru, Guru Nanak Dev ji preaches the humankind that there should not be any discrimination on the basis of gender and women must be given high respect. The Guru says "From woman, man is born; within woman, man is conceived; to woman he is engaged and married. Woman becomes his friend; through woman, the future generations come. When his woman dies, he seeks another woman; to woman he bound. So why call her bad? From her, kings are born. From woman, woman is born; without woman there would be no one at all".

The college is managed by SGPC, Sri Amritsar, the apex body of Sikhs and it's a specific direction of the college management to establish a *Nanhi Chaan Cell* in the college and to have special efforts for the girl education. The efforts made in this direction are as under:

- The college organized a UGC sponsored National conference on Indian Women: Position and Perspective.
- The college organized ICSSR sponsored seminar on "Women and Crime : Problem and Remedy".
- The college celebrates International Women Day every year and enlightens the society about women related issues.
- The publication cell of college published 2 books specifically on women issues. The first was on the poetry composed about women by different Punjabi poets and the second was a book of articles on different women issues.
- The college constructed a girls hostel where 232 girls are residing from different parts of the country.

- The college introduced 5 awards of excellence for the girl students of the college to promote girl education.
- The college ensures every year that the single girl child should apply for UGC scholarship for the said purpose.
- The college organizes one girls meet every year to make them aware about their rights, education and other issues.
- The *Nanhi Chaan Cell* of the institution organizes many programmes on women empowerment, gender equality and health issues.
- Every year the famous Indian festival Lohri is dedicated to girls and they ignite the pious ceremony of lighting the *Lohri*.
- The college celebrates every year the *Teej* festival great fervour.
- The college has started to publish a annual magazine of the hostel dedicated to the girls named *Dhian* (Daughters).
- The college launched a campaign among the boy students to go for dowry free marriage.

Inclusion:

The college is very particular about the differently abled, unprivileged, down trodden and economically deprived of sections of the society. Various types of scholarships and fee-concessions are given to the students belonging to these categories. It is ensured that no student who so ever has applied for admission is never deprived of admission because of the monetary factors. The Goodwill Cell, various departmental associations and faculty members contribute magnanimously for this purpose.

Environment issues:

The institution organizes various programmes for the preservation and protection of environment. The following programmes are worth mentioning in this context:

- The college celebrates the birthday of seventh Sikh Master, Guru Har Rai Ji as the Environment Day and plants saplings on this auspicious day.
- The institution has PTA rose garden, Botanical garden and land specifically marked for growing organic food. The college makes special efforts for solid

waste management, waste water management, biological waste disposal and rain water harvesting.

- The college organized an interfaith UGC sponsored National conference on Environment Management where the spiritual scholars and Gurus across the country participated in it.
- The publication cell of the college published a book titled "Environmental Issues: Spiritual Solutions".
- The college organizes various competitions like poster making, declamation, slogan writing to create awareness about the environmental issues.
- The Green Chem Club of the institution oganises rallies to spread awareness among students celebrate Eco-safe green Diwali.
- Punjabi University Patiala has made it mandatory for every undergraduate student to pass the compulsory paper of Environment Studies.
- NSS, NCC, Youth Club, Environment Club and other societies of the college involves student in various activities for environmental sensitization.

Human Rights:

The institution has Legal Literacy Cell for spreading awareness about various issues including human rights concerning the society. Students and faculty members are made aware about the human rights through the lectures and interactions with them. The institution is located in a city of Patiala which was blessed by the Ninth Sikh Master Guru Teg Bahadur, who laid down his life for the protection of the rights and faiths of the people of a religion that he did not profess. The institution makes conscious efforts to protect and preserve the human rights and at the same time ensures that no violation of any kind may take place in the institution.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners and brilliant students are identified on the basis of their merit in the last qualifying examination, their interactions with the teachers in the class, performance in class tests and mid-semester tests, assignments, class presentations and their overall exposure to the different aspects of life. These students are provided free books from the college Book Bank. Special classes are

organized for such students along with the personal care from their tutors. These are also encouraged to participate in different programmes like seminars, conferences, placement drives and other related activities. These students are also encouraged and guided to present papers, prepare projects and participate in deliberations in various State/National level activities in different institutions. The classes for the preparation of UGC-NET examination for different PG classes are also organized every year.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The Registrar office of the college maintains the data of students from the disadvantaged section of the society and other unprivileged or differently-abled students. The class incharges identify those students who are at the risk of dropping out because of economic or other factors. These students are provided various types of aids, scholarships, fee concessions and other required facilities. It is ensured that no drop out should occur because of the monetary and other factors. Special remedial classes are organized for the slow learners and weak students.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college prepares academic calendar every year and same is made available to the students. The academic calendar is also uploaded on the college website. It contains the details not only of the academic activities but also of all other activities in the college. The teaching is scheduled as per the dates prescribed by the affiliating university and academic calendar is followed.

Subjects are allotted to the teachers in accordance with their specialization in the departmental meetings. The teachers draw a weekly/monthly plan of the syllabus which is duly communicated to the students and the copy of the same is given to the Dean Academics for effective implementation. Heads of the Departments

ensure the completion of the syllabus according to the plan by getting the feedback. Staff council meetings, departmental meetings and staff meetings are conducted from time to time to discuss the academic plans and matters. The academic time table is drawn keeping in view the convenience of the students. A suggestion box has been installed in the college and the students provide their feedback regarding the academic programmes through this also. The students are also encouraged to interact with the faculty members regarding their academic issues and problems. The student's representatives of different classes also keep regular contact with their teacher incharges and heads of the departments regarding their academic and other pursuits.

The evaluation schedule is based on class tests, mid semester tests, conditional tests and the final examination. The students are also evaluated on the basis of their assignments, projects, seminars, viva, workshops and class participation. Student's progress is also communicated to their parents/guardians through PTA meetings and letters.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

IQAC of the college makes efforts for the development of a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution and to assure all the stakeholders connected with higher education about the quality of education provided by the institution. IQAC is constantly working towards the realizing the goal of quality enhancement and sustenance. IQAC has periodical interaction with the students and the faculty to create a healthy environment for teaching and learning. It invites suggestions from the students and faculty in order to make the teaching learning process effective and student centric. It organizes seminars and interactive meets frequently in order to provide a proper platform for useful interactions among the different stakeholders. It also collects feedback from the students which is analysed every year in order to make improvements in teaching learning process.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The learning is made more student-centric by the following process. The teacher gets all the information about the subject from the department then it is transmitted to the student. He/She considers responsible for students learning. He/She makes sure the students work and he/she consider herself to be an expert to make right judgment and decision regarding their learning.

The students are encouraged to be proactive in the class and create a reciprocal atmosphere where not only the teacher, even the students do participate. The learning process is made more interactive through the use of different support system like LCD/LED projectors, Live projects and educational documentaries. The teaching process also includes presentations, group discussions mock interviews, seminars, business quiz, elocution etc. Discussions on case studies are organized in the class room to enhance interpersonal skills and industrial visits/education tours are organized to give the students a practical knowledge and exposure. The workshops are conducted in many of the courses in order to give the students a real working experience. The college has ample resources in terms of library, computer labs, soft skill labs and other infrastructure to supplement the learning process of the students.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The students are encouraged to write on topics of wide range. Then these writings are evaluated by the editors of the college magazine 'The Patiala'. The students also contribute to the newsletters of departments. They are also asked to write on various events and days of the importance and the same are put up on prominent places in the college so that all the students become acquainted with those writings. To instill critical faculty among the students, various societies/clubs in the college organise seminar/extension lectures and debates under which various topics are assigned to express their views critically and scientifically/technically. The students are encouraged to ask questions. They are shown movies and they have to answer the questions that they had been given before the start of the movie. Many student-centric activities like debate, declamation, extempore speeches, group discussion, seminars, project works, various competitions like poster making, slogan writing, painting etc., Tech fest, management fest,

workshops, Literature fest etc. are also organized every year in order to nurture creativity, critical thinking and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators. The department of English and Foreign Languages is publishing a book which will contain the creative writings of the students.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The teachers are encouraged to use ICT tools for the effective implementation of the curriculum. Most of the class rooms are fully equipped with latest pedagogical requirements like LED's, laptops, digital visualizers etc. Most of the teachers use these facilities to make their teaching effective and interesting. The college campus is completely Wi-Fi enabled and teachers are given free access to use internet as per their requirement and convenience to augment their subject knowledge. The soft skills lab specifically built by the college tries to improve communication skills in English. It also helps students to get structured practice sessions, evaluations and comparisons thereby making language learning more effective and meaningful.

The library of the college has an extensive and varied collection of books, journals and magazines. This collection is augmented on a regular basis. The whole information regarding books is available on WEBOPAC that can be seen on the touch screen available in the library and through internet also. The teachers regularly visit the library and use the library resources for the purpose of their teaching and enhancement of their knowledge. The teachers are also encouraged to read the books beyond their syllabus so that they can deliver better knowledge to their students. The college also possesses the e-library facility from INFLIBNET. The college seminar hall is fully equipped with the power podium, digital projector, remote screen and high class sound system. The college is in the process of setting up a state-of-the-art video conferencing room.

The college has well equipped Science laboratories with ultramodern and sophisticated equipments viz; Fermentor, UV-VIS spectrophotometer, refrigerated

orbital shaker, Elisa reader, Analytical balance, homegeniser, high quality binocular microscopes, laminar flow, Hall's effect, G.M. counter, CRO (Two beam), Operational Amplifier e/m apparatus etc.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The students are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills through extension lectures/seminars/workshops etc. Orientation programmes are held to brush up the knowledge of the teachers. National level, State level and college level seminars are organized regularly to enhance the research capabilities of the faculty as well as students. National and International experts are invited to deliver lectures/talks/presentations to the faculty and students. Faculty members are also encouraged to attend National and International conferences, seminars, workshops and symposiums etc. They are partially funded to participate in such programmes. Some of the faculty members have attended such conferences out of the country also. The teachers are also motivated for research projects and as a result many of the faculty members have either completed or in the process of completion of UGC Minor/Major research projects. Many of the faculty members have completed their Ph.D during the last five years and many more are under the process of completion. The students and teachers are also given free internet facility in the college campus.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students\benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The students are given special care regarding their professional and personal requirements. They are told how to acquire professional proficiency by introducing them to human resources from industry. Tutors are assigned groups of students to whom they can have access regarding their personal problems. New students are taken special care of so that no ragging etc. takes place and this provides psycho-social support to them. Counselling is done to the students to sensitize them about the pitfalls of some social evils like addiction to drugs and female feticide and such related issues. Dr. Ganda Singh Career, Counselling and Placement Centre of the college provides professional counselling/mentoring/ academic advice to the students regarding their career choices, employment

opportunities and job aptitudes. Some of the programmes undertaken are as follows:

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

The college encourages the faculty to use innovative techniques in teaching and learning by using the modern ICT based teaching aids and facilities such as computers, projectors, visualisers etc. The teachers have been attending seminars, workshops, conferences and symposiums continuously for the last four years. Innovative techniques like giving them exercise to multiple choice questions, presentation of drama and novels through CDs in the abridged forms, Mockinterviews etc. are used to lead to healthy learning. These innovative practices of teaching are able to create better interest of students in their subjects and have better impact on their retention. It is pertinent to mention that the number of class rooms with ICT facility has gone up from 5 to 35 within the last four years.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library of the college has an extensive and varied collection of books, journals and magazines. This collection is augmented on a regular basis. The information regarding books is available on WEBOPAC that can be seen on the touch screen available in the library and through internet also. The teachers regularly visit the library and use the library resources for the purpose of their teaching and

enhancement of their knowledge. The teachers are also encouraged to read the books beyond their syllabus so that they can deliver better knowledge to their students. The college also possesses the e-library facility from INFLIBNET.

The students are given easy access to the library. They can borrow books, they can sit and study there, they can read different types of magazine/journals. They can consult dictionaries and encyclopedia. A proper academic atmosphere prevails there where both the teachers and the faculty stand benefited. Moreover, departmental libraries are also maintained in the college to cater to the needs of the students and teachers of a particular department.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The institution generally does not face any difficulty in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar. Substitute teacher are hired against leave vacancies and for the teachers who are deputed on exam duty. The teachers take extra classes to complete the syllabus in emergency cases. Every effort is made to ensure timely completion of the syllabus.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The academic results and other achievements of the students are monitored and evaluated by the Examination Branch of the college as well as the records of important achievement are also kept by the concerned departments. The college Principal and Heads of the departments monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through interactions with the students and faculty. The feedback proforme are also evaluated in order to know about the quality of teaching learning. The faculty members are supposed to fill in the self appraisal proforma and the same is evaluated by the college Principal.

2.4 TEACHER QUALITY

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The college ensures that meritorious and qualified teachers should be put on

Permanent faculty of the college is recruited by the Directorate of Education of SGPC by following the proper procedure of the affiliating university. The recruitments are made as per the UGC norms and the meritorious and competent candidates are selected. The adhoc faculty is also appointed through the proper selection procedure.

The faculty members are given proper facilities to update themselves for the changing requirements of the curriculum. They are allowed and encouraged to attend workshops, seminars, conferences and courses for the purpose and at same time many workshops for building their competency are also organized in the institution.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The institution is under the management of SGPC, Sri Amritsar, an apex body of the Sikhs. The very purpose of the management is the propagation of value based education among the youth. It pays the UGC scales to its faculty and it is the first private management in the State to implement the latest UGC scales. Whenever the posts are advertised, people prefer to join the SGPC run institutions because of its credibility and commitment towards the cause of education. The institution offers all the perks and benefits as per UGC guidelines. The institution even has created the posts of Professors in the different subjects and it has again taken a lead in promoting one of the Associate Professors as Professor under the Career Advancement Scheme. These types of promotional avenues also encourage the people to join the institution.

The faculty members are also encouraged to take part in short term courses, orientation courses, refresher courses, seminars, conferences, symposiums, workshops and other faculty development programmes in order to allow them to update their knowledge and skills. The institution has taken many new initiatives by starting the time and market focused professional and vocational programmes in the institution and the faculty members have been adequately trained for the same purpose.

The resultant outcome is that the institution never faces any shortage or scarcity of the qualified, capable and competent faculty in the institution.

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

The teachers are encouraged to attend refresher courses, HRD programmes, orientation programmes to upgrade teaching quality as is depicted in the following of last four years:

Various faculty training programmes are organized by the institution for the teachers. Induction and Orientation workshop ranging from one to five days is organized for newly recruited teachers. In these workshops they are made aware of various policies of the colleges and they are taught teaching learning methods, use of audio-visual aids and multimedia and other ICT tools. They are encouraged to constantly work on enriching themselves in their respective fields and are motivated to participate and handle the co-curricular activities according to their interest.

Regular staff meetings are held to discuss the cross cutting issues being faced by the society and institution. The Principal apprises the teachers about the latest pedagogical innovations and faculty is encouraged to use these latest tools in the teaching and research process. They are constantly motivated imbibe the mission, vision and objectives of the college and to further help imbibe it in the students.

Departmental meeting are held on the regular basis to discuss and plan the handling of the curriculum, developing of learning material and its use and assessment criteria.

The college provides conducive environment, financial help, hi-tech technology and modern infrastructure to the teachers to help them sharpen their academics and other interests.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, the college has introduced evaluation of teachers by the students. The students of all classes fill the feedback proforma provided by the college in which they register their views about the teaching process. They register which teachers they liked the most and why. They also report which teachers they were not satisfied with and they also give reasons for their dissatisfaction. The concerned committee analysis the feedback and orients the faculty towards the better methods of reaching the students. The proforma also contains questions about their feedback on the college.

The grievance cell has put up suggestion boxes in college where students can drop their feedback on the teaching process. The cell opens the boxes regularly and collects the feedback which is analysed by the committee with the principal and necessary action is taken and conveyed to the students.

Heads of the departments and co-ordinators of classes keep interacting with students to take their feedback on accessibility to teachers and teaching methods adopted in the class.

The college takes the services of an academician who regularly visits college and interacts with the students of MBA and MLD classes. He collects their feedback on pedagogical methods used in the classes and shares the feedback with the faculty with an aim to improve teaching learning process and to make more practical oriented. He not only monitor the entire teaching process but also guides the faculty on how to incorporate the latest teaching methods in their style of teaching.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

At the onset of the session, academic calendar is prepared by the institution which contains the tentative dates of internal as well external examination and the same is informed to the students by the class incharges. The faculty is made aware of the evaluation process during departmental meetings. They are told about taking regular class tests, monthly tests, mid semester tests and how to evaluate students on the basis of class performance and to make every single students perform in the class. The heads of the department ensure that every teacher has a copy of the syllabus which they are going to teach in the class. The syllabus is notified to the students which has the important information regarding theory, practical internal and external bifurcation of marks. The students are made well aware about the division of internal and external marks. For example their internal assessment depends upon their performance in mid semester tests, class performance, assignments, attendance and presentation and the students will have to prove

themselves on these fronts. The result of mid semester tests and status of their attendance is conveyed to their parents during parents teachers meeting and is also dispatched to their addresses.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The university has initiated semester system in all streams and our institution has whole heartedly adopted the change. And on its part the institution has brought major reform in internal evaluation of the students by conducting two mid semester tests to evaluate the progress of students. The result is dispatched to the student's home address. The shortcomings are discussed with the students and improved method to attempt paper is also discussed. The college ensures that each department evaluates students on day to day basis. For this students appear for internal viva, present seminars, submit reports, and assignments. The institution has brought these major reforms to make students better prepared for their external exams, interviews and viva.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college enjoys the privilege as centre of table marking of annual and semester examination of Punjabi University, Patiala for the last four years. Moreover the college Principal is an active member of examination and evaluation reform committee. His suggestion about effective implementation of evaluation reforms are accepted whole heartedly.

The college has well established examination branch which effectively conveys and implement the evaluation reforms of the university. Any communication from university regarding improvement in evaluation is conveyed to the head of the departments by this branch which is further conveyed to the students through the class incharges. Similarly any reform is disseminated in the similar way.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Summative assessments of students is carried out by mid semester tests, house examinations, assignments, seminars and practical tests. On the basis of

summative evaluation, remedial classes are planned to address the gap between the actual and desired performances.

Formative evaluation of the students is carried out to help students identify their strengths and weaknesses and target areas that need to work on. On the basis of this evaluation teachers and students formulate new instructional modes and improve their teaching and learning skills respectively. The students are engaged in activities like role play, group discussion, case studies, subject quiz and competitions, industrial/visit etc. to fulfill the he goal of formative assessment.

Example: The School of Commerce and Management arranges various competitions like Salesman of the year, Treasure Hunt, Spring spree Fest etc. to impart Management Skills to the students. These competitions help students to identify their strengths and weaknesses and target areas that need to be worked upon. It also helps faculty recognize where students are struggling and address problems immediately. Specifically the Salesman of the Year competitions teaches students the strategies and skills of a salesman. A team of five students is formed and they are given various items to sell to the students and teachers within the specified time. The winner team is one which makes the maximum profit within that specified time. The students learn the tricks of the trade in practical manner and later all teams discuss their experiences among themselves.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The process of internal assessment is made transparent and the bifurcation of internal assessment is decided upon on the basis of the prescribed syllabus and further departmental discussions are held with an aim to improve the rigor and transparency in the internal assessment. All those activities are included in the evaluation that would enhance overall development of the students like active participation in group projects/ presentations, assignments, seminars and participation in other co-curricular activities such as NCC, NSS, Sports, Cultural etc.

The transparency is ensured by the following ways:

- 1. The bifurcation of internal assessment is communicated to the students by the teachers and it is open for discussion.
- 2. The evaluated answer booklets for internal assessment are returned to their students for their self assessment.
- 3. In addition to that the overall behaviour of the students in the class and interaction with the teachers is also a criterion for the internal assessment.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The college has specified graduate attributes in its quality policy and objectives. These attributes are a regular feature in the strategic plan of the college for continuous and comprehensive learning, self reliance and social responsibility. The college runs various awareness programmes and activities through various clubs and cells like NCC, NSS, Youth Club, Goodwill Cell, Health Club, Red Cross Society, Nanhi Chaan Cell, Gurmat Soicety, Guru Gobind Study Circle, Population Club, Anti Ragging Cell to develop these attributes in the students. The activities organized by these cells and societies sensitize the students towards society, community, employability and ensure holistic development of their personality with a view to contribute to the development of a knowledge society.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The college has well developed redressal system to address the grievances of students regarding evaluation system.

1. The teacher returns the answer sheets of internal exams to the students after evaluation. In case some grievance the students can contact the teacher. The

- teacher evaluates the answer sheet in the presence of the student and apprises the student regarding the shortcoming in the answer sheet.
- 2. If the student is not satisfied with the internal evaluation, he/she gives in writing to the class in-charge and subsequently the same is forward by the departmental head to the examination branch to review the case at college level.

Whereas, at university level, the following redressal system works:

- 1. In case of some discrepancy in the question paper, the grievance of the students is forwarded through the Principal to the Controller Examination of the affiliating university. The university forms the committee to redress the problem and takes the required action.
- 2. Moreover university offers the facility of re-checking and re-evaluation of their answer sheets on payment basis.

2.6 STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the college has already stated learning outcomes which are reflected in the mission, quality policy and objectives of the college. The teachers are committed to achieve the same as they have already been updated in staff meetings/induction programmes. The students are made aware of these objectives during meeting with Principal, Head of the Department and class co-ordinators. It is also included in the college prospectus and displayed at appropriate places in the college campus. The learning outcomes ensures that it prepares and trains students in a manner which converts them into a work ready force, equipped with soft skills not only good in IQ but also in EQ.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The institution monitors the progress of the students through internal examination system and communicates the same through the respective departments to students

and parents. The consolidate records of the students is prepared and maintained in the examination branch and also maintained by respective departments. It is conveyed to the students by the class incharges and also conveyed to the parents during PTA meets. In addition to that results are also posted at postal address. 2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

Effective teaching, effective learning, effective assessment strategies ensure the achievement of intended learning outcomes. A dynamic staff council headed by the Principal of the college defines teaching, learning and assessment strategies to facilitate the achievement of intended learning outcome. It is further conveyed to the various committees formed to implement and to monitor the strategies. The committees on their part regularly give the feedback of the implementation of the various programmes to the Principal for the remedial actions if required.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The institution is concerned about the social and economic relevance of the courses offered. Most of the faculty members are members of Board of studies at the university level. During the meetings the faculty members give their valuable views and opinions to make the courses socially and economically relevant. At the institutional level, the clubs and societies conduct workshops, seminars, extension lectures to enhance the research aptitude of the students. Stress is laid on demonstration, using teaching aids, involvement in activities and use of audiovisual methods

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The institution collects data from departments, associations, committees, clubs and societies regarding the learning outcome in various academic and co-curriculum activities. Various committees like Examination committee, academic record committee and statistical collection committee and placement cell tabulate the data. On the basis of analysis, modified plans are made in staff meeting/departmental meetings to overcome the gaps and barriers of learning. The barriers are overcome as early as possible.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The head of the institution monitors and ensures the achievement of learning outcomes. At the time of admission, new students along with their parents are

made aware of the same. At the commencement of academic session various induction and orientation programmes are held for the students to make them aware of the learning objectives. During the course institute continuously monitor the achievement level through mid-term tests, class tests, assignments, seminars, field visits, presentations etc. and takes necessary steps accordingly. The progression and the placement record is also analysed to monitor the achievement of learning objective and outcomes.

2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes, the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning.

The students are grouped on the basis of their performance into three groups: Bright, Moderate and Weak students. Booster classes are arranged for bright one, and remedial classes are held for the weak students. At individual level, teachers pay special attention to the weak students and take extra-classes, if required.

For example, Department of Biotechnology divides the whole class in different groups and each group has two bright, two moderate and two weak students. These groups are assigned the presentations. This helps and motivates the moderate and weak students and encourages the bright students. This method not only boosts up the confidence of the weak students but also enhances the team spirit.

Any other relevant information regarding Teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include.

Teachers constantly upgrade themselves as they believe that learning never stops. Workshop, Seminars and Conferences help them to be better teachers. Experience teaches them and they also get input from the seniors and colleagues. In the departmental meetings the teachers are prodded to include the following in their teaching for optimum teaching learning. The teacher is encouraged to start the lecture by stimulating learners that is beginning the period with a recap of the previous day lecture. This recap not only proves to be a revision for students it

also proves useful to the ones who were not present in class that day or who had doubts in their course. This proves to be win-win situation. This prepares the students for further learning and the students are prepared to receive and retain the subject. This usually takes 2-3 minutes and then the teaching takes place. Teachers are asked to utilize last 5 minutes to wind up the lecture. The teacher enumerates the important point and summary that they learnt in the class.

Similarly, tutorial groups again provide teachers time to be close to students to discuss latest news, trends. The preparation of important topics, moral values, tips on healthy living, safe driving, safe drinking water are discussed. The students are evaluated not only on the basis of academic achievements but also how they carry themselves, conduct themselves in team, extend help to others.

Moreover for the students who join the college late are given attention by the concerned teachers by providing them notes, books from departmental library, summary of the lesson. This exercise proves very helpful and effective in maximizing teaching and learning. The teacher acts as not only a teacher but also a facilitator, mentor and trainer.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION



3.1 PROMOTION OF RESEARCH

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Yes, the college is a recognized research centre of University Grants Commission as well as Punjabi University, Patiala. The University Grants Commission has sanctioned major projects to three faculty members of the institution and the research fellows working with them are carrying their research in the college labs and are pursuing their Ph.D on the topics of the project. Moreover, 10 faculty members of the college have been supervising the research scholars for Ph.D registered with Punjabi University, Patiala- the affiliating university of the college. The University has allowed those candidates to work under the guidance of college faculty members in the college campus itself. These candidates frequently visit the college premises. The departments which are guiding the research students are School of Commerce and Management, Department of Punjabi, Department of Computer Science and Department of Biotechnology.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes, the college has a research committee which works under the Dean Research of the college. The committee motivates and encourages the teachers to pursue Ph.D, apply for minor and major research projects to various agencies like UGC, ICSSR to participate in various National & International seminars, Workshops and Conferences and to write research papers and articles to various journals and magazines.

The proposals of the prospective researchers are discussed and recommendations are made to them regarding their proposals. The impact of the research committee is that many of the young teachers and senior faculty members have completed their Ph.D or in the process of completing it. The overall environment in the institution is research oriented and research focused which is clearly visible from the number of research projects being carried on by the faculty members and their participation in various National and International conferences and the published work carried out by them during the last five years.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The college is a hub of research activities. The faculty members are motivated and encouraged to apply for various projects sponsored by the national agencies like UGC, ICSSR etc. The teachers are given special duty leaves to attend the seminars and conferences. They are given partial funding for such activities. More specifically, the following are the measure taken by the institution to facilitate the smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects:

- The teachers are encouraged to apply for minor and major projects of University Grants Commission and they are guided by the research committee in the preparation of synopsis etc. The result is that 27 faculty members have either completed or in the process of completion of their minor or major projects.
- The college governing body Shiromani Gurudwara Parbandhak Committee
 has created a special fund known as 'Research Fund' to partially fund their
 teachers in their research ventures.
- The teachers are encouraged to participate in National and International seminars and conferences and are partially funded to enable them to attend the same. The visible result is that the number of faculty members who attended National and International conferences in the country is quite large and even 8 faculty members of the college have participated in International conferences in foreign countries like USA, UK, France, Belgium, Canada, Japan, Hong-Kong, Australia and Denmark.
- The infrastructural and other academic facilities in the departments are
 ensured in an effective manner so that the faculty members can get congenial
 academic environment for pursuing their research activities. The library is
 updated continuously and the faculty members are always welcomed to
 recommend any addition to this knowledge store house of the college.
- The college also organizes many seminars, conferences and interactive sessions to inculcate the research values among the faculty members and the students, particularly of the post graduation classes. The resultant outcome is that some of our post graduation students have started their Ph.D immediately after the completion of their P.G Degree.

• The college ensures timely completion of all the documentation formalities concerning their research projects. The principal investigators are also given complete freedom in their research projects and no interference is made in their functioning by the administration.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution believes that scientific temper and research culture and aptitude are the important elements for the holistic development of the students. The activities and efforts of the college in this regard are as under:

- There are many courses in the college where the students are supposed to write project reports, seminar training reports and other assignments. All these reports are supervised by the faculty members and the students carry out research in the area allotted to them.
- The students are given various assignments which are based on different surveys in order to develop the research bent of mind in them.
- Various seminars, extension lecturers, educational tours, industrial visits and the live projects are conducted in the institution in order to disseminate the research culture among the students.

3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc.

Most of the faculty members of the college involved in active research in one or the other way. The following teachers are involved in supervising the Ph.D candidates, minor/major research projects and teacher research fellowships:

Besides the above list, many of our faculty members are writing research papers for various journals, participating in various seminars and conferences and writing assignments and books.

3.1.6 Give details of workshops/training programmes/sensitization programmes conducted/organized by the institution with focus on capacity building in terms of research and imbibing research culture among the staff and students.

The college conducts workshops, training programmes and sensitization programmes quite frequently in order to imbibe and promote research culture among the staff and students. The experts and scholars from the country and abroad are invited to guide the faculty members and the students.

For example: One research workshop on 'How to write for Research Journals was conducted by Dr. Mahesh Joshi from RMIT, Australia. Similarly Dr. Indi Seera from University of Cambridge, UK interacted with the staff and post graduation students about the research avenues available in the University of Cambridge. A delegate from Japan interacted with science students about the research facilities in University of Japan. Dr. Surya Pandey from Wakitto Institute of Technology, New Zealand, interacted with staff and students about the ongoing research projects in New Zealand. Similarly Prof. K.K Uppal and Dr. Gurdeep Singh Batra motivated the staff and students about the value of research in life. College principal Dr. Dharminder Singh Ubha through his various interactions with the faculty encouraged the faculty members to pursue the research and develop the research bent of mind.

3.1.7 Provide details of prioritised research areas and the expertise available with the institution.

The college believes that the research conducted in isolation is if no use. The conscious efforts are made to motivate the faculty members about the choice of those topics for their research which are socially relevant and are beneficial to the society at large. For example Dr. S.S. Ahluwalia of Department of Bio-Technology has been working continuously in the area of Bio-Remediation for the protection of environment. Dr. Arvind Sabharwal has conducted his research on Investigation of Uranium in air, soil and water which are the major causes of cancer in the state of Punjab so that the people and state machinery can be made aware about the corrective measures. Dr. Jasleen Kaur conducted her research on 'Management and Leadership values in Sikh Scripture' so that the younger generation of the country can be motivated to pursue the value based qualities in their material ventures. Dr. Ravinderjit Singh conducted his research on 'Ethnic Entrepreneurship' so as to guide the youth of the state about the unique entrepreneurial traits of the most successful business community i.e. the Marwari community of the country. Similarly Dr. Balbir Kaur conducted a study about the dietary habits and pattern among the people of the State. These are few examples to quote and many more such projects have been handled and are being taken up by the faculty members. The recommendations of the above research works are going to impact the society at large and remedial agencies in an effective manner.

The faculty members are always encouraged for such activities and always allowed duty leave or special leave for their research ventures. Two staff members namely Dr. Nipunjot Kaur and Prof. Gursimarjit Kaur have availed the sabbatical leave during the Eleventh plan for their research. The financial assistance has been also granted to 27 faculty members by University Grants Commission for their minor and major research projects.

The research conducted and seminars and conferences organized will not be of much use if these are not brought in published form. 3.2 RESOURCE MOBILIZATION FOR RESEARCH

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

There is no specific allocation of the budget for the research. However, Shiromni Gurudwara Parbandhak Committee, the governing body of college has set up Rs.10,00,000/- (Rupees Ten Lacs only) p.a. in its budget for research fund for faculty members of the colleges under its management. The college also supports the research endeavors of the faculty members. Every effort is made to update and upgrade the infrastructure, labs and library facility in the institution. The grants from University Grants Commission are also sought and received for the up gradation of facilities in the college. Partial funding is also provided to the teachers participating in national and international conferences and the resources

of the college are also used to organize National and International Seminars and Conferences.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The governing body of the institution has earmarked Rs.10,00,000/- (Rupees Ten Lacs only) as a research fund for the faculty members to encourage research in the institutions under its management. Similarly, the faculty members are also encouraged to make the best use of national funding agencies like UGC and 27 faculty members have availed the research grant for the minor & major research projects, two teachers have availed the teacher fellowship and 3 teachers have availed the travel grant from University Grants Commission during the last 5 years.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

The students of the institution are provided free internet facility in the institution to carry out their research projects. The college has subscribed to the INFLIBINET facility of UGC where hundreds of e-journals and e-books are available and the same are also available to the students for their research purposes.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

Though no direct components of interdisciplinary research are there as per University norms yet some of the researches conducted and going on in the college are more or less are interdisciplinary in nature. For example: Dr. Arvind Sabharwal from Department of Physics studied the contamination of Uranium and its resultant impact on quality of potable water signifies the interdisciplinary nature of project. The research work of Dr. Sarabjit Singh Ahliwalia, Department of Bio-Technology, is on Bio-Remediates of heavy metals and textiledize which is focused on ecological impact. Dr. Kuldeep Singh Department of Chemistry has studied the environmental reports of corporate sector in India. Dr. Jasleen Kaur studied Sikh spirituality to guide the mentors of business world about the great

values of Sikh Gurus in order to have a sustainable development in the world economy. Dr. Tarloachan Singh Mahajan from Department of Physics has conducted his research on the effect of electric and magnetic field on seeds.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The college is the only institution in Punjabi University, Patiala which works in two shifts. The physical facilities are available to the staff and students from 8.15 in the morning till 6.00 in the evening. The whole campus and the girls hostel is Wi-Fi enabled and teachers and students are given free of cost facility to use internet. It is ensured that all the resources available to the students are used in optimum manner.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

The college has received finances from University Grants Commission for development of research facilities under various schemes. For example: the college has received Rs.10,00,000/- (Rupees Ten Lacs only) from UGC for development of science labs. The college has also received grants from Punjab State Science Council for organizing the workshops on patent awareness. Similarly, grants from University Grants Commission have been received for organizing national seminars.

3.3 RESEARCH FACILITIES

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The college has Wi-Fi enabled campus and the students and research scholars are given free access to internet. The college computer labs are ultra modern with the latest facilities. The students are allowed to use the computer labs as and when they are vacant. The college has a air conditioned library with more than 32,000 books and journals of all subjects. Besides, the college has the facility of online journals and books. The faculty members are provided free reprographic facilities.

3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?

The college believes in thinking ahead, thinking new and thinking differently. It has introduced many time relevant and market relevant courses in the areas of Food Processing, Green House Technology, Software Development, Leadership Development, Accounting & Finance and Auto Electrical & Electronics.

The institution keeping in view the emerging areas has always planned for the upgradation and updation of infrastructural and academic facilities. The college always looks for the various grants from various agencies and has been able to get many grants for the updation and creation of new facilities for the research. The online availability of e-books and e-journals is also available in the college library. The college also encourages its faculty members to apply for research projects in the emerging areas.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities?? If 'yes', what are the instruments/facilities created during the last four years.

Yes, the college has received special grants and finances from University Grants Commission and college governing council for the updation and upgradation of research facilities in the college. There is a major turn-around in the college computer centre, labs and college library which are considered to be the knowledge bank in the present knowledge economy. The computer labs are equipped with the latest computers and the faculty members are equipped with the latest pedagogy in teaching.

3.3.4 What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

The college students are encouraged to carry on different projects and the career guidance cell of the college makes every effort to ensure various tie-ups with the institutions and industrial organizations in order to arrange the facilities for their research in those institutions. Moreover, the students are also allowed to visit the library of the other institutions under the management of the governing council.

3.3.5 Provide details on the library/ information resource centre or any other facilities available specifically for the researchers?

The college library is the rich source of knowledge for the staff, students and scholars. It has a stock of more than 32000 books, 65 journals and magazines. It has enlisted programme of INFLIBNET. The library is completely computerized and the digital system of receipt and issue of books is followed. The touch screens are installed in the library to help the students and staff in locating the books required by them. Internet facility is also available in library. The library is regularly updated and upgraded.

The college has tied up with many industries and other institutions where the students can visit for their research purpose. The college placement centre offers every kind of help to the students in their research pursuits and arranges collaboration outside the college campus.

- The development microbial consortia, a product for decolonization of textile waste water.
- It is a novel process for the preparation of polyurethanes.
- The research conducted by Dr. Ratanpal Singh Randhawa is based on preparation of biodegradable polyurethanes under mild conditions without using any toxic catalyst thus it is economical and eco-friendly.

Research studies carried out by the faculty members are benefiting the community and society at large. Many of their studies relate to the various facts of life. For example: Study conducted by Dr. Balbir Kaur guide the society about the dietary habits and patterns to be followed in life. Similarly study of Dr. Tarlochan Singh Mahajan highlights the role of electromagnetic effect on the growth of seeds.

The research studies of Dr. Jasleen Kaur and Dr. Raviderjit Singh contribute a lot for the social development. Similarly many minor & major research projects also contribute to new initiatives and overall development of the society.

Academic collaborations are undertaken as per the need of the curriculum. The relevant companies are contacted and other collaborations are need based such as Medical support, Insurance, waste paper recycling etc.

On the basis of the need, extensive survey is done to locate nearby industry/organization. A personal contact is established with the selected organization. Agreement is signed between the two for the benefit of both.

Any other relevant information regarding Research, Consultancy and Extension which the college would like to include.

The college has planned to establish Advanced Sciences Research Centre, Food Park, Agricultural Research Centre and Consultancy Centre on various environmental, social, economic and industrial issues. More faculty members have been encouraged to apply for minor/major research projects. Faculty exchange has also been planned at the national and international level.

- b) Extra –curricular activities sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.
 - **Sports**: The College has well-maintained playgrounds for outdoor games like Hockey, Football, Handball, Basketball, Athletics, Volleyball, Kabaddi, Cricket, Kho-Kho, Baseball and Martial Arts etc. It has floodlight facility also. Indoor games like Table Tennis, Chess, Carrom Board are also available to the students. Expert coaches train the student for various games.

- **Gymnasium**: The College has a well equipped gymnasium with 24 latest machines like single workout for muscles, various multi-fitness programmes. The gym facility is also available in hostel for the residents.
- NSS/NCC: 3 units of NSS 2 for boys and 1 for girls are working successfully in the college. NCC comprises of 2 units – Army wing and Air wing. The college has separate well maintained offices and stores for NSS/NCC.
- Cultural Activities: The College occupies a pride of place in field of cultural activities in the university. The college has well built stage and open air facility for the cultural activities. The common and open grounds are used for the rehearsal of the cultural items to be presented in various functions and festivals.
- Public speaking and communication skills development: Soft skills lab and smart class rooms are readily available to the students.
- Yoga, Health and Hygiene: Medical services to students and faculty are provided by the Health Centre of the college. The Physician is daily available in the college. She visits the hostel twice a week. The Health Centre also organizes lectures on health issues in the college as well as in the girls hostel. The college Physician and other eminent doctors are invited to interact specially with the girl students to address their physical, psychological problems. The college has signed MOU with two leading hospitals of Patiala Columbia Asia and Amar Hospital. In case of emergency the students are taken to these hospitals where they are treated at subsidized rates. These hospitals also provide free medical aid on the occasion of various college functions like Sports Day and festivals. Yoga Camps are also organized by the sports department.
- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? The college works in two shifts and utilizes the available infrastructure optimally. Expansion of the infrastructure and other facilities – availability of Rooms, Labs,

seating area in the Canteen, Library and Grounds according to the increase in number of students - is planned before the commencement of the new session. Laboratories are regularly upgraded as per the requirements. The college would soon be establishing a new campus of 20 acres for research in advance science.

The election commission, UGC, Income tax authorities, Banks, PSPCL and other government and non-government agencies utilize college campus for the purpose of conducting election, competitive exams and training programs.

Departmental rooms are also used for the practice of cultural activities. Conference Hall is utilized for conducting seminar, workshops, academic and literally and cultural activities, induction and orientation programmes, lectures, talks and for placement drives.

College lobby is optimally utilized for blood donation camps, exhibitions etc.

Play grounds and gymnasium are used by students for holding festivals, NCC/NSS camps, for the welcome and farewell parties etc. Specified areas of the playground have been ear-marked for holding outdoor classes.

24 hour security check is available.

Health centre takes care of the health issues of students as well as the faculty. The doctor treats as well as counsels the students on health and hygiene issues. The college has signed MOU's with two leading hospitals of the Patiala where students

are taken in case of emergency where they avail treatment on subsidized rates. Doctors are invited to interact with students as well residents on health issues.

 - Dr. Ganda Singh Career Counseling, Guidance and Placement Centre organizes various workshops, seminars, guest lectures and placement drives. Booster and Remedial Classes, Special Classes for personality development and for interview preparation are also arranged by the cell.
 - The health centre of the college provides medical services to its students and faculty. The Physician is available in the college every day. She visits the hostel twice a week.
 - The college cafeteria provides healthy and hygienic snacks and food to the students and the faculty. It also arranges meals during seminars and conferences.
 - Gurdwara Sahib, Cafeteria, Gymnasium, Stadium, Library, Social Club get- together provide refreshing moments to the students and the faculty to unwind themselves.
 - College has its own tube-wells. Water coolers and RO systems are installed at appropriate places for safe drinking water.
 - State Bank of Patiala offers its services in the college campus.
 - Free transport is at the disposal of the hostel residents.
 - Book, Stationary Shop and Reprography facility are available in the college campus.

There are touch screen LEDs in the library which contain information about the cataloging of books. The e-cataloging of books and journals is being maintained regularly in the library. Library staff supports the students and teachers of the college to locate the books through the touch screen LEDs installed in the library. With the assistance of library staff books can be browsed, if the book is available the book is issued to the user. The library staff suggests the user another related book on the subject if the same is not available. The staff also makes available old news paper and magazines if and when required by the user.

The users can also get the reference material photocopied, printed and downloaded. The list of new arrival is put on the notice board of the library which informs the student about the latest additions to the library. Economically weak students as well as meritorious students are issued books for the entire session from PTA fund by the library staff.

Braille books are available in the library for the use by visually challenged users. In case of need the news paper section, reference section and issue and return section can be made operational at the ground floor for the convenience of physically challenged users. - The college provides its students a central computing facility equipped with 20 computers and broadband Internet connection, printer, scanner and photocopier. Students are utilizing this facility for their project work. On the special request of students or faculty members, this CCF is also opened during holidays or examination days.
- Smart classrooms provide students' access to ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces.
- Video conferencing facility is available for the staff and the students.
- Computers along with Wi-Fi connection is made available to all the departments.
- The college has a well equipped soft skills lab to improve communication skills in English.

For example, in the soft skills lab teacher launches student activity on computer and supports them while they work individually, in pairs or in groups. They monitor student response and run testing exercises. With this, teachers personalize

the teaching experience. The Department of Computer Science holds mid-term test of some its subjects online.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The institute has formulated a committee for the maintenance and development of the infra-structure facilities of the college. The heads of the different department place the requirement for the maintenance and upkeep of the infra-structure with the development committee. The committee discusses the issues with principal with estimated cost and subsequently the approval is sought from College Management Committee. System analyst, System administrator, Lab assistants, Technical assistants are responsible for maintenance and upkeep of the equipments.

Most of the instruments are calibrated at least twice a year or whenever required. Further instruments provide accurate and precise results within admissible experimental error. Instruments are installed in various department and their calibrations and precision measure are taken care by the respective departments.

Scientific instruments are installed in the concerned department in dust and dump free environment. Voltage stabilizers/UPS/Invertors are used to protect costly and sophisticated instruments from voltage fluctuations. Equipments are maintained by the faculty members of the concerned department for their accuracy and precision. The college has its own tube well and overhead tank for constant supply of water.

The college has purchased the equipments for the establishment of video conferencing room and it has been planned to have interactive session with different experts across the globe through this medium. 5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

5.1.1 Does the institution publish its updated prospectus/handbook annually? If 'yes', what is the information provided to students through these documents and how does the institution ensure its commitment and accountability?

Yes, the institution publishes its updated prospectus annually. The college publishes four types of prospectus - one for conventional courses published in vernacular language, second for professional and PG courses, published in English language, third for MLD- an innovative course granted by UGC and the fourth one is the hostel prospectus. It encompasses the Goals/ Mission and Objectives of the institution. It provides the students with requisite guidelines for the admission as well as the courses available at the college. Information regarding fee structure, scholarships and free ships is made clear to the students. They are also acquainted with the rules and regulations of the institute. The prospectus also gives the details about the academic achievements, awards and accreditation. The details of various committees, clubs and societies are also given in these documents. The institution facilitates the Minority Scholarship by the GOI, SC/ST Scholarship, scholarship to OBC students, Single Girl child scholarship as per UGC, Scholarships provided by the college staff and the foreign scholarship provided by the SGPC for higher studies. All the scholarship forms are filled on time by the students and funds are made available on prompt basis.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for:

Following is the details of specific support services/facilities available for different categories of students

Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:

SC/ST/OBC and economically weaker sections of society are given scholarships and fee concessions as per the government and university norms. These students are also given free books from the library for the whole of the session. The remedial, entry level coaching and other classes are also held for the students belonging to above categories. The UGC has also given grants during the eleventh plan for the above said activities to the college.

Students with physical disabilities:

The college is highly sensitive to the requirements of the physically challenged students. The physical facilities as per the requirements have been created in the institution and every care is taken to ensure that they do not face any hardship in the institution. The effort is also made to ensure that they remain emotionally upbeat in the institution under all the circumstances.

Overseas students:

The college has two overseas students, one from USA and the other from Canada. Though they are of Indian origin, yet because of their upbringing in the foreign culture, they are given special care in dealing with their academic, cultural and

social issues. The girl from USA selected the institution to learn the *Gurmat Sangeet* as hobby and same has been taught to her.

Students to participate in various competitions/National and International:

The students are encouraged to participate in National and International level competitions in the field of academics, sports and co-curricular activities. They are provided with travel facilities, boarding and lodging facilities, refreshment etc. as per the norms.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance, etc.:

The college provides professional medical services to its students and the staff. The physician is available for the whole week. Health talks and lectures on issues like nutrition, abuses of drugs, remedies of depression, stress and eating disorders etc are a regular feature. The college has a tie-up with the world class hospitals, Columbia Asia and Amar Hospital. Under which Health Insurance is provided to girls residing in the Hostel (75% of the charges are borne by the college and students has to pay only 25% expenses of the policy). First Aid Kit is available in the College Office and Gymnasium. Regular dental, cardiac, orthopedic and skin camps/checkups are organized for the wellness of the students. Free medical support is available during all the college events like sports, fests etc. from the hospital under MOUs.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams:

Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre organizes regular classes to prepare the students for competitive exams like UGC/NET. Soft skill workshops are also organized to enhance the communication skills of the students.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.):

Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre organizes workshops, lectures and special classes to train students for group discussion, interviews and overall personality development. Regularly students undergo training to excel in communication, computing and management skills etc.

Departments are also encouraged to organize class presentations, essay writing competitions, debates, quiz and book review sessions to enhance the spoken English/Punjabi skills, writing skills and presentation skills of the students.

Support for "slow learners":

Slow learners are provided with Personal counseling, Remedial coaching, extra classes, tests and assignments. Meetings with parents of slow learners are also regularly carried on. Student performance records are mailed to parents to keep them updated with the academic performance of their ward.

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/business house, etc.

Experts from industry and corporate houses are invited as guest speaker to interact with students. Students visit various business/corporate/industrial houses to study and to understand the working/processing of these houses. Further students also enroll themselves with these to undertake their summer projects.

Publication of student magazines:

The students are encouraged to exhibit their talent/hidden potentialities through their writings in 'The Patiala', an annual college magazine. The college owns independent publication cell that promotes the writing skills of the students. Departments like English, Punjabi and Computer Science publish their newsletter with the creative writings of the students.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

Various efforts made to facilitate entrepreneurial skills among the students along with their impacts are as follows:

- ➤ Live projects, summer training, major projects are a compulsory part in some of post graduate and graduate programmes. These projects initiate the student's productive employment. The experience gained by the students in these projects lends the necessary momentum in their future pursuits.
- Regular educational/industrial tours and visits are organized. These excursions provide practical insights to the students.

- ➤ Innovations in the curriculum with the introduction of entrepreneurial skills as a subject in (B.Com, BBA, B.com Prof, and B.Com Accounting & Finance) has academically strengthen the students. This knowledge has given them an edge over other candidates in various sectors of economy. It has also augmented the job avenues to the students.
- ➤ Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre organizes various workshops/seminars/guest lecturers to motivate the students and open new vistas to them. Students have been benefited and have ventured into Banking, Insurance and Corporations.

Impact:

These workshops /seminars and activities help in fostering an environment where the entrepreneurial skills of the students are enhanced, which helps them in getting admissions in reputed institutions, in clearing competitive exams and in getting jobs.

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, quiz competitions, debate & discussions, cultural activities etc.

The College has various committees to encourage students to participate in various sports and cultural activities. At the very onset of the session the students are apprised of extra-curricular, co-curricular activities through notices. The cultural committee headed by Dean cultural formulate a policy so that teachers in-charge of activities like Debate, Quiz competition, Elocution, Drama, Dance and song competition, Folk dance, Rangoli, Skit, on the Spot Painting, Photography etc. take charge to enroll the students for these activities. After enrolment the short listing is done on the basis of Talent Hunt programme. Judges select the students who show their worth. During the month long training before the Youth Festival, which is major cultural event of the year the conducted by Punjabi University, Patiala, the students are given free diet and refreshment as they stay back after college hours for practice.

Dean Sports admits the students to the department of Physical Education on the basis of trials and on the past achievements of the students. Coaches are hired for the training of teams. Special coaching camps are conducted to participate in

various competitions. To cultivate sportsman spirit and recreation inter-mural competitions are held regularly for faculty and students. Annual Athletic Meet is held every year in which the students are divided into four houses representing each stream/faculty. This way not only the students of Physical Education Department but other students who have a flair for sports can participate and excel. In collaboration with Dean cultural the department promotes folk games like Tug of War etc. The department extends supports to other department in conducting various sports events.

The college recognizes and rewards the winners at Annual Prize Distribution function held every year.

The departments form Clubs and Societies like Arya Bhata club, Computonics Club, English literary society, Gurmat Society, Nanhi Chaan Cell etc. in which students are sensitized to work for the welfare of the community. To achieve this purpose, clubs & societies organize the extension lectures, quiz competitions, literature carnivals etc.

Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations

- Seats are reserved for students who excel in sports and cultural activities in various courses.
- Students involved in sports and cultural activities are given priority in the admission process.
- Special examination schedule is prepared to accommodate the students who had gone to represent college in tournament or other competitions, if required.

Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials

- For sports students following incentives are provided to motivate and encourage them.
 - i. Full fee and full fund concession to International sports person and all India Inter-varsity medalist.
 - ii. Half fee and full fund concession to junior National medalist and senior State level medalist.
 - iii. Half fee and half fund concession to inter college medalist.
 - iv. Free boarding and hostel facility and mess facility to sports wing students.
 - v. Free coaching

- vi. Special diet
- vii. Roll of Honour and College color
- viii. Free sports kit and equipments
- ix. Extra classes for sports person
- x. TA/DA
- xi. Cash prize to outstanding sports person.
- xii. Medalist of National level gets scholarship provided by S.A.I. through college.

Any other

- For students who make a mark in cultural and co-curricular activities following incentives are provided to motivate and encourage them

 - ii. Free coaching

- 5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR-NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE/CAT/GRE/TOFEL/GMAT/Central/State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.
 - ➤ The digital library of the institute is well equipped with various books, journals, magazines. A free access and online sources enables the students to prepare for the competitive examinations.
 - ➤ Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre organizes regular classes for preparing students for competitive exams like UGC/NET. Soft skill workshops enhance the communication skills of the students.
 - ➤ Guest lectures are arranged to enhance the knowledge of the students regarding attending questions in competitive exams.
 - The students are made aware about the opportunities by the teachers also.

Seventeen students of the college have cleared UGC NET in the past four years. Many of our students are well placed in organizations like Punjab Police, Armed Forces, FCI, Banks after clearing their competitive exams.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

The faculty participates in academic, personal, career and psycho-social counseling of the students

Academic counseling:

- One to one counseling of the students with their class in-charges
- Parent-teacher meetings
- Expert lectures are arranged subject-wise during the semester
- Remedial classes for academically weak students are arranged.
- Booster classes for brilliant students
- Teachers give information about weightage to different chapters in different papers and also discuss about the nature of questions on the each topic.

Personal Counselling:

The college has a Grievance Cell which handles the personal problems of the students along with other problems. Departmental heads, teachers and class incharges also help the students in sorting out their personal problems, if any. The college invites experts who prepare and guide the students in handling and overcoming their personal problems.

Social-Cultural Counseling:

Seminars and discussions on socio-cultural issues are conducted by the staff to inculcate the moral and ethical values in the students and to address to their queries.

Career Counselling:

Various career oriented guidance lectures are also conducted by Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre. The centre provides training modules which cover aptitude tests, group discussions, interview techniques, self-motivation, stress management and a host of other need based skills for the students.



5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The institution has a strong anti-sexual harassment committee, which is empowered to deal with cases pertaining to sexual harassment. The college provides a congenial environment for the students and the teachers.

- The institution has assigned each teacher proctorial duty in which group of teachers in each period move around in the campus keeping a vigilant eye on the students.
- The institution has 24×7 security at the college entry gate and in the girls' hostel. As a result no outsider can enter the college and hostel premises.
- CCTV cameras have been installed at important places across the campus to keep a watchful eye on the students.
- The college sensitizes boys and girls towards such issues by conducting lectures and group discussions.

Due to alertness of Principal and faculty no such case has been reported on sexual harassment in the institution till date.

Yes, the anti-ragging cell has been formed by the institution which directs the students to give an undertaking at the time of admission that they will not indulge in any form of ragging. Notices are put up at prominent places discouraging students to participate in this evil practice. Moreover fresher parties, formal guided junior-senior interaction and orientation programmes play a pivotal role in nipping the evil in the bud. The college and the hostel are free from the bullying and ragging activities.

An extension counter of State Bank of Patiala is situated on the premises of the college for the convenience of students and staff.

Goodwill Cell

The Goodwill Cell generates funds to help the needy students. The teachers and students contribute generously to this fund which is used to finance the fee of needy students and also provides them with the books.

Book Bank facility

Books free of cost are provided to meritorious and poor students from the PTA fund.

NSS

NSS department enrolls student at the beginning of the session it conducts camps for the awareness of the students. Some of the activities that are undertaken by the department over the year are as stated below:

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The college keeping in view the aspirations and requirements of the students has started many post graduate time relevant courses in order to facilitate them for their further studies. The number of students who have got admission in these courses after the completion of their graduation from this very institution is quite large. The institution also motivates and encourages the students to pursue higher education in order to get better avenues and placements in life. The result is that the most of the students belonging to professional courses at the graduation level pursue post graduation in different institutions. The student progression rate of 21% is quite significant keeping in view the national targets.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The College provides special support to students who are at risk of failure and dropout, which is as follows:

- The institution supports the students who are at risk of failure and dropouts by organizing special remedial classes which help them in improving their academic performance.
- Special attention is given to the weak students by the class in charges.

5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

The IQAC of the college collects the data from the students by prodding them to fill in the feedback performa at the end of the session. The performas are analysed by the cell. The data received from its graduates help a lot to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. Some of the examples of improving the performance and the quality of institutional provisions are cited below:

- Many new courses were introduced in the college on the basis of demand put up by the students.
- Teacher orientation programmes have been introduced to improve their performance in the classes. Teachers are counseled on soft skills and they are given tips to empathize with the students.
- College cafeteria has been extended and upgraded.
- To accommodate students in free periods, seating arrangement has been increased.
- Library facility has been augmented by adding books, newspapers and journals. Air conditioned reading hall has been added to the library.
- Girls hostel was constructed for the comfortable stay of girls coming from far away areas.

The college takes formal as well as informal feedback from the alumni during the alumni meets and their suggestions are considered for the improvement of the students.

Self-appraisal proforme of the teachers and report prepared after the analysis of the student feedback are communicated to the Principal. The Principal discusses and presents the analysis of both types of feedback with the management during Local Management Committee meetings.

The college assigns the duties of chief- editor, deputy chief -editors and editors to the teachers of different streams. Teacher editors encourage students to give their original creative writing to the concerned incharges. The student editor assist the concerned teacher editor in compiling the articles, stories, poems, jokes, thoughts, essays, personal experience received by the students for the college magazine 'The Patiala' which is published annually. In addition to it all the departments bring out news letter, wall magazine and catalogue. The theme is announced to the students

For example, Department of English brings out "Sprouts" – its newsletter thrice in a year. Department of Computer Science brings out its newsletter – Computonics times and Department of Punjabi brings out its wall magazine twice a year. All these contain original creative writing of the students.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The strength of any organization can be measured by the capacity of its members to be leaders at many levels. The institute offers faculty the opportunity to develop their leadership skills and provides a valuable opportunity to step away from day-to-day responsibilities and thoughtfully consider their individual and collective leadership roles within the institute. The faculty at all levels is part of plethora of committees ranging from academic and non academic activities, where they learn and inculcate the various nuances related to development of leadership skills.

The College is one of the premier institutions of higher education in the State and a leading educational institution of Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee, Sri Amritsar. The SGPC management has been always supportive for the development of the college at all levels. President SGPC and other academic administrators of the college continuously strive for participation of the staff. The college has highly motivated staff who round the year upgrade their teaching quality through active involvement in workshops, seminars, R&D, conferences etc. The working culture of the organisation is highly conducive for holistic learning of students and staff. The staff members are represented at various administrative/ management/ departmental meetings/ committees as coordinators, convenors and members, holding certain authority and responsibility to complete the desired academic and extra-curricular activities in the best possible manner within the stipulated time.

Principal of the college works on principle of 4D's: dedication, devotion, discipline and diligence thereby imbibing quality and excellence in his staff

members. College has its independent IQAC, UGC-NRC and publication cell for the conscious, consistent improvement of the academic and administrative performance of the institution, staff and students.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college works on the principle of creating leaders not just the followers. The governing council of the college after evaluating the work of College Principal has given him the additional charge of Director Education of SGPC. He along with looking after the administration of the college is managing the hundred plus schools and colleges. Principal intern has delegated and decentralised many of the powers and positions. There are two Vice Principals who are looking after the academic and administrative work respectively. The Registrar Examination is all empowered to take major decisions regarding the examination system in the college. The offices of the Deans are there to look after their respective areas. Heads of the departments are given the freedom to plan, prioritize and execute the departmental activities. The programme co-ordinators and class teacher in-charges are the direct line managers and decision makers for their area of operation. Similarly Accounts officer, Superintendent General, Superintendent Examination, System Analysts are authorized to take decision in their respective fields.

To promote the leadership among the students, class representatives are nominated by the class in-charges on the basis of their overall performance. They are also appointed as officer bearers of various societies, clubs and associations. They are also encouraged to organise departmental fests, programmes, interactions and parties. All these are undertaken by them independently with a little guidance from the teachers. The organisation and handling of these activities infuse in them leadership qualities.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

➤ SGPC, the apex governing body of the College, with the local management committee and the Principal as the leader guide in the entire administrative setup of the college to ensure the continuous growth and development of the college.

- ➤ The Vice Principal (administration) takes care of the proper functioning of the college. The Vice Principal (academics) is the highest academic decision making body who implements and monitors all academic matters.
- ➤ The Heads of the Departments act as the standing committee of the Academic Council which is empowered to take decisions on behalf of the Academic Council at respective departmental level issues.
- ➤ HOD appoints co-ordinators responsible for the working and administration of the class in-charges and student representatives who monitor regular progress of the studies.
- The financial matters like allocation of funds and paying of liabilities are taken up by the finance committee.
- ➤ The non-teaching staff acts as a back bone of the organisation providing assistance in planning, monitoring and implementing matters relating to accounts, examination and documentation.
- ➤ The college has various sub-committees acting as an intermediary between the students and the college administration.

Yes, the college has committed participative management in all the activities. All decisions taken by the management are taken up after deliberations and discussions. 6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.



The programmes and projects which require financial funding of 40,000/- Rupees are referred to the president of the governing body or the management committee and their approval is received for the same. The head of the institution ensures that the information available on the website is up to date and is provided in appropriate manner so as to leave no space of misunderstanding or misrepresentation of any fact. College email Id is regularly checked by the head of the institution and mails are sent to the various

stakeholders to provide them information about the latest activities. Annual general meeting is organized at least once in a year and as per the requirement with the top management to discuss the important issues related to the college. PTA meet is organized where interaction between teachers and parents is facilitated so as to inform the parents about the progress of the college and the development of their ward. Annual reports are prepared and distributed to the stakeholders. A strong communication system has been developed in the college so as to provide everybody with appropriate information on timely basis. Sessions are organized to facilitate the interaction between the students and the head of the institution. A Grievance cell is being run in the college to address the grievance of students and staff. The students and the staff are free to register their complaints with the Cell, which are taken up with the Principal and a fair solution is found to redress their grievances.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

This belief supports the principle of participative leadership and enables involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes. Multiple leadership to govern work processes in the academic and administrative area leads to enhanced involvement of staff members.

The Management and the Principal encourage the members of faculty to give their opinion or suggestion whenever and wherever necessary. The Management encourages the students in all the extracurricular activities like NSS and Sports by providing sufficient fund. The NSS students are involved in regular activities and camp activities for which the management supports them with sufficient fund. For sports the college participates in one inter collegiate tournament every year conducted by the management by the name of "Khalsai Games". For some of the coaching camps conducted in the college, the management grants financial assistance to the students for certain coaching camps held in the college. In the field of research the management gives incentives to the faculty who publish research articles in national / international refereed journals. The Management provides sufficient fund to the faculties and departments to conduct seminars conferences, and FDP in every academic year. Benefits are also provided to the faculty who have completed Ph.D./UGC-NET.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The management committee in its meeting held on 5th December, 2013 made the following important resolutions:

i. The management decided to give one special increment to college staff because of the glorious performance and for the commitment and dedication of the staff.

Status: The special has been granted to the staff.

ii. The management decided to apply the new API norms for the promotion of the teaching staff.

Status: API norms have been implemented.

iii. It was decided to establish Music Studio in the college.

Status: It is under process

iv. It was decided to give higher scales and Ph.D increments to the staff members whose cases were presented.

Status: These have been granted.

v. It was decided to install solar lights and RO system in the college and in the hostel.

Status: These have been installed.

vi. It was decided to have student safety insurance for the residents.

Status: All student of the hostel have been covered under the insurance scheme.

vii. It was decided to ratify the promotion of Dr. Jasleen Kaur as Professor in Commerce under CAS.

Status: Decision was ratified.

viii. It was decided to create three new posts of professor and two new posts of associate professor under direct recruitment.

Status: The posts have been created.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, there is provision in the affiliating university for granting autonomy to the affiliated colleges. The college plans to apply for autonomous status to the UGC in the coming session. However, under the community college scheme of UGC, the affiliating university has granted autonomy to the college for designing the curriculum, conducting the examination and awarding the certificates.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

Yes, the institution tries its level best to resolve the grievance/complaints of all the stakeholders of the institution. The college has established grievance/redressal cell and all the grievances are brought to the notice of cell and resolved accordingly. The grievance/redressal cell and the college administrative machinery is proactive in handling the complaints and grievances. Sometimes the complaints and grievances are also brought to the notice of college administration through the PTA and OSA meetings. They are also redressed immediately. It is always ensured that the cordial relationships should exist with the stakeholder and the continuous growing number of the students is a testimony to the above said fact.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

There are two court cases filed by the ex-Principals, Dr. Harbir Singh and S. Gurtej Singh. However, these cases are directly against the Government of Punjab regarding the payment of some arrears and the college has been included as a party in those cases. The decision of both the cases is pending.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, IQAC cell of the college receives the student feedback on institutional performance. Though the practice of taking student feedback is in place for the last many years, the feedback proforma was redesigned as per the guidelines of UGC to collect student feedback on institutional performance. The institutional responded in pro-active way after analyzing the feedback and some of the examples of the outcome is as follows:

- Many new courses have been introduced in the college on the basis of demand put up by the students.
- Teacher orientation programmes have been introduced to help teachers perform better in the classes. Teachers are counseled on soft skills and they are given tips to empathize with the students.
- College cafeteria has been extended and upgraded.
- To accommodate students in free periods seating arrangement has been increased.
- Library facility has been augmented by adding books news papers and journals. Air conditioned reading hall has been added to the library.
- Girls hostel was constructed for the comfortable stay of girls coming from far away areas.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The college makes conscious efforts for the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff. Teachers are allowed and encouraged to attend orientation courses, refresher courses, faculty development programmes, seminars, conferences, workshops and other training programmes. The college also conducts orientation and faculty development programmes in the institution. The teachers are also encouraged to improve their qualification. The institution has fixed up a target that hundred percent of its regular faculty members must be

Ph.D. The result is that almost all the non Ph.D. teachers have registered themselves for the same. Similarly, for non-teaching staff, the staff development programmes are organized by the institution. Special workshops have been organized to train them on the computer. They are also encouraged to improve their educational qualifications.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college believes that human resources are the most important asset in any organization. The trained and motivated faculty can transform any organization into a successful organization. The management of the college is the best pay master in the region. It has implemented the new scales of UGC by being first in the state among the private aided colleges. Even the eligible adhoc teachers are paid good salary. The faculty is also given the best kind of in house facilities so that it can work in a cordial and congenial manner. The teachers are also encouraged to participate in various professional development activities.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

There is a self appraisal system for the staff. The staff members fill in the self appraisal performa which is verified by the college Principal and they are given the score as per their performance. The self appraisal performa contains detailed information on the multiple activities and roles they perform in the institution. The overall grading of the staff on their ACRs is done on the basis of the above evaluation.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The reports of the performance of the staff are communicated to the management in the meetings of the management. In case of any negative performance, the same is communicated to the concerned staff member and the required action is taken. For performing staff members, the increments and the promotions are given as per the norms. The management in its meeting held on December 5, 2013 gave one

special increment to all the staff members of the college in recognition of the performance of the total staff in the development of the institution.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The staff welfare schemes available in the institution are as under:

- Timely payments of gratuity, leave encashment and other retirement benefits are made to retiring staff members.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The college management, Shiromani Gurudwara Parbandhak Committe, is a well-known and most respected organization in the state. It is the apex body of the Sikhs which manages Gurudwaras, Educational Institutions, Hospitals and many other charitable institutions. It has been created under the special act of legislature-1925. The very aim of the institutions working under its management is not to earn the profits but to render service to the society. Most of the colleges under its governance are occupying a pride of place in the educational map of the state. General Shivdev Singh Diwan Gurbachan Singh Khalsa College, Patiala is also an institution with the brand name in education in the area. As s result, the people prefer to join the institution because they feel it as a secure and comfortable destination for working.

6.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The institution prepares the budget every year which is approved by the management. An effort is made to maintain a proper balance between the recurring and development expenditure. The optimum utilization of the available resources is ensured.

The internal audit of the institutions is done every month by the auditors appointed by the college management. The accounts are totally computerized. The external audit is done by the external auditors and it is done every year. The audit of the latest financial year is expected to be complete by 20th September, 2014. The compliance of any objection, if there, is ensured.

- To train students for physical fitness and to make students aware of their cultural roots various festivals are celebrated. Khalsai Games held annually by the management provide all round development to the students.
- To sensitize the students towards environment, plantation drives and lectures are organized regularly. They are encouraged to switch off lights and fans when not in use. They are also given tips to recycle paper and waste products.
- To inculcate moral and ethical education, the students along with faculty members visit old age home, orphanages and hospital to share their bounties with the needy ones.
- To polish the hidden capabilities of students, 'Talent Hunt' programme,
 Youth Festival and other inter and intra college competitions provides
 students a platform to showcase their talent. The annual college magazine
 'The Patiala' take out their latent capabilities.
- To appreciate the deserving students, 'Prize Distribution Function', and 'Sports Function' is held annually also five awards of excellence are given every year to meritorious girl students who have shown metal in academic, sports and cultural activities.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Yes, the institution organizes various training programmes, workshops and seminars on various topics to achieve excellence in higher education. The impact was excellent in curricular aspects, teaching learning and evaluation, research consultancy and extension, infrastructure and learning resources, student supports and progression, governance and leadership and all innovative practices.

Raj Khurana, Former Chief Parliamentary Secretary, Punjab, Jathedar Avtar Singh, President, SGPC, Prof. Kirpal Singh Badungar, Former, President SGPC, Dr. Jaspal Singh Vice Chancellor Punjabi University, Patiala, Dr. Abhey Maurya, Vice Chancellor, Foreign Language University, Hydrabad, Sh. OM Puri, leading bollywood star etc. addressed the faculty and the students in order to groom them as leaders.

- 6. The institution has fully computerized library. It also subscribes to many magazines, news papers and journals. The college also possesses e-library facility.
- 7. The college has well maintained Basketball, Volleyball, Football, Handball, Cricket, Hockey, Athletics, Kho-Kho, Kabaddi and Baseball Playgrounds and a Gymnasium for its players. Many of our players have won laurels at National and International level.
- 8. The college has a hostel which provides accommodation to 234 girl students. Players are given free accommodation in the hostel.
- 9. The college has Gurdwara Sahib where various religious functions are held to inculcate religious and moral values in the students.
- 10. The college has highly advanced labs of Computers, Soft Skills, Sciences and Home Science.
- 11. The college has signed three MOUs with foreign universities (University of Cambridge, UK, WINTEC, New Zealand and Sheridan Institute of Technology, Toronto Canada for Ph.D. twining/dual degree program in accounting) to give our students global exposure.
- 12. A doctor regularly visits college and hotel to look after the medical needs of its students. The institution has signed MOU with the leading hospital of Patiala.
- 13. The college has a strong Old Students Association. Old students regularly visit college to share their valuable views for the development of the college.
- 14. Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre invites reputed companies to place its students. The Centre holds classes for skill development like Communication, Analytical and Interview skills.
- 15. The College is proud of its dedicated and well qualified faculty who believes in constantly upgrading themselves.
- 16. Most of the faculty members are engaged in UGC and other research projects.
- 17. The college and hostel has zero tolerance towards ragging.

- 18. The college has an efficient Nanhi Chaan Cell which looks after the needs of its girl students by creating awareness with activities like seminars, drives and campaigns. The cell constantly highlights issues like gender equality, female foeticide, environment education among the students and society at large.
- 19. IQAC of the college aims to develop a system towards realizing the goal of quality enhancement and system sustenance.
- 20. The Media Centre is engaged in the role of dispersing information regarding various activities and achievements carried out in the college throughout the year.
- 21. PTA cell of the college invites parents regularly to apprise them about their wards' performance in the classes.
- 22. The college gives scholarships and free books to financially poor students and brilliant students to motivate them.
- 23. The college has highly efficient and dedicated non-teaching staff to run the examination, administration and other activities smoothly.
- 24. The college has its own publication cell which publishes books and journals on regular basis.
- 25. The college has 3 units of NSS, and one unit each of NCC Army wing and NCC Air wing.
- 26. The college is connected with Internet leased line and campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled.

Weaknesses

- 1. As per today's market/industry requirements, students lack the requisite communication and soft skills as almost 50% of the students are from rural areas.
- 2. Students lack reading habits which is a necessity for the overall growth and development.
- 3. Few students are involved in research activities due to lack of such facilities on the campus.
- 4. The college hostel has a provision to accommodate only 234 girl students whereas the demand is much higher than the capacity. The college does not have its own boy's hostel.
- 5. There is no ATM facility on the campus.

6. The college receives inadequate grant from DPI Colleges, Punjab.

Opportunities

- 1. The college is strategically positioned in the heart of Patiala which leads to good intake of urban and rural students.
- 2. Punjabi University Patiala fully co-operates us in academic and administrative affairs.
- 3. Directorate of Education, SGPC, governing body of the college, provides valuable inputs for the growth and development of the college
- 4. Students and faculty have an easy access to Punjabi University, Patiala library which helps them in their research work.
- 5. Existence of Banks and service sector in the city provides good employment opportunities to the students of Commerce and Management.

Challenges

- 1. Patiala, being hub of education, provides tough competition to the college.
- 2. The institution faces difficulty in placing its students due to the lack of industry in Patiala and nearby areas.
- 3. Due to infrequent availability of public transport students, especially girl students, find it difficult to stay back for their classes after a particular time.
- 4. Since the syllabus is designed and implemented by the University the college does not enjoy much freedom in curriculum design.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES



7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, the institute regularly conducts a green audit of its campus and its facilities. Internal Green Audit Team of the college reviews environment related initiatives. The NSS wing and Youth Club (YC) of the college provide assistance to improve the environmental conditions. They regularly conduct programs to establish eco friendly atmosphere on the campus as well as the hostel. The student volunteers campaign extensively to make the campus a plastic free zone These campaigns prove conducive in generating awareness about the dangers of using plastic materials.

The institution has formulated action plan for the next academic year as under:

- i. To effect proper waste reduction and recycling practices through education and communication efforts.
- ii. To create awareness for using reusable components for manual use and making the environment plastic free.
- iii. To train the students in 'lab to land programme in tissue culturing, vermicomposting, ornamental plants and medical plants.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college adheres to the guidelines put forward by the Ministry of Environment and Forests, Government of India for inculcating environment consciousness in the society. Following are the sectors in which college is actively working and participating in order to ensure the importance of carbon footprints.

Energy Conservation

Along with the academic activities, the institute is constantly working to make the campus environment friendly. Efforts are made to make the most of the energy provided by Mother Nature. The rainwater is directed to low lying areas/agricultural fields of the college so that it may percolate the earth. Similarly, low-energy internal and external lighting (both CFL and LED) are installed in the college and hostel campus.

Use of Renewable Energy

To use the most of the renewable energy the classrooms are designed to have maximum number of windows, to ensure the maximum day light and air during the day. Similarly, by using Solar lights in the campus, electricity consumption is reduced and hence, the carbon footprints.

Water Harvesting

In order to save the precious water, the agriculture department of the college is actively working on this issue. The rain water and the tap water are directed to the experimental field lands and different flower beds in the college.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality

The college works on the principle of taking his share from nature and giving something back so that future may get the right amount of share we are having from the environment. To ensure this and to reduce the carbon footprints, the NSS Cell of College has formed a compost pit using earthworm to avoid carbon footprints. The recycling of chemicals is done in chemistry lab. The Stationary items are sold to paper industry and the use of recycled paper is always encouraged. Plantation drives are organized under NSS and Youth Club of the college. The chemistry department organizes the Anti Cracker Rally under the banner of Green Chemistry Club of the college to reduce both the air and sound pollution. Use of technology is encouraged to save the paper and reduce carbon footprints and message is sent by emails and SMS by mobiles. The construction department is encouraged to buy and use A-rated electrical appliances. The college office uses double side paper printing, if required. Similarly, environment related educational programmes are organized by NSS to spread eco-sensibility.

Hazardous waste management

College manages the hazardous waste like chemicals, oils, pesticides, cleaners. Each type of waste is collected in different containers and is disposed accordingly so that it may not contaminate the environment and increase the carbon footprints.

E-waste management

The college has tie up with Punjab Pollution Control Board, which has recommended a few firms to pick the e-waste. The college dumps only the e-waste recommended by the above said authority.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

There is no denying the fact that creativity and innovation lead to the development of the organization. The vision of the college 'Strive for perfection and Settle for Excellence' motivates the college to think new, to think ahead and to think different. Even the small steps taken in an innovative manner lead to fruitful achievements. The various innovative practices and efforts of the institution which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college are as under: -

- 1. Master of Leadership Development: An Innovative Programme of University Grants Commission: The College has designed an innovative Masters Programme Master of Leadership Development under the Innovative courses scheme of University Grants Commission. The same was approved by the University Grants Commission in the year 2013. This course is designed basically to overcome the leadership crises in the country. This innovative course received a tremendous response from the students. It has elicited eulogy from various institutes and even the affiliating university. The curriculum has mobilized the students to explore the new avenues of decision making. GSSDGS Khalsa College, Patiala is the only institution of Punjabi University, Patiala which has been allotted any innovative course by University Grants Commission till date.
- 2. Introduction of Bachelor of Vocation Course in 'Software Development' and 'Food Processing and Engineering': In the current year, University Grants Commission initiated a new programme titled Bachelor of Vocation with multiple entry and exit points. The college applied for two programmes: Software Development and Food Processing and Engineering.

The scheme was sent with innovative ideas so that the students pursuing these courses may be in a position not only to get the relevant jobs but also be able to work as entrepreneurs in their respective vocations.

The scheme was appreciated by the University Grants Commission and as a result, the college was placed among those 92 institutions of the country which were selected for the Bachelor of Vocation course in the institution.

- 3. Introduction of Courses under Community College Scheme: University Grants Commission introduced a scheme of Community College for those students who are unable to enter the normal programme of the institution. The college applied for Community College in Green House Technology and Advanced Diploma in Auto Electricals and Electronics. The college designed the curriculum in a manner which is useful to make the entrants fit for pursuing their own careers. The University Grants Commission approved the scheme of the college and as a result, the college was allotted the Community College in the above streams. It is pertinent to note that GSSDGS Khalsa College, Patiala is the only institution in Punjabi University, Patiala allotted the course under this scheme.
- 4. Introduction of Time and Market Relevant Professional Courses in the Institution: The college took the initiative in Punjabi University, Patiala by proposing B.Com (Professional), B.Com (Accounting & Finance), B.A (Professional), Post Graduate Diploma in Business Journalism, Post Graduate Diploma in Web Designing and many other diploma courses. All these courses were appreciated and approved by Punjabi University. The curriculum of all these courses was so designed that it has an optimum mix of theoretical and practical exposure. The innovative ideas in these courses made them popular among the students and many institutions in the state have followed suit.
- **5. UGC-NRC:** College has its own UGC Network Resource Center to create awareness amongst the staff and students about the use of computers in various activities like administration, Finance, Examination and Research.

- 6. Internal Quality Assurance Cell: IQAC develops a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution and to assure all the stakeholders connected with higher education about the quality of education provided by the institution.
- 7. Media Center: Media Center is engaged in the role of dispersing information regarding the various activities and achievements carried out in the college throughout the year. It also maintains a record of photographs, CD's and annual reports etc.
- 8. Publication: The publication cell works round the clock and publishes a biannual journal "Global Journal of Accounting & Management", and the college magazine "The Patiala" and a number of souvenirs, brochures etc. Conferences and workshops are organized to transform higher education through greater innovations and on the basis of selected papers the Publication Cell has published eight books so far.
- **9. R&D:** The College believes in innovative teaching & research. Teachers having higher achievements in field of research are awarded regularly. Financial and non-financial assistance at international and national levels are provided to the teachers to attend various conferences and seminars.

Workshops and seminars are also held for the teaching and non-teaching staff to re-brush their knowledge and skills. Most of the college teachers are involved in major/minor projects approved by the UGC.

- **10. Infrastructure:** The College adopts change theory where rapid and continuous changes are being made in providing quality education to the society. The infrastructure is upgraded as per the needs of the changing education scenario to provide state-of-the-art infrastructure.
- 11. Teaching Aids: Various new teaching, pedagogical aids like projectors, e-boards, LED power podiums etc. are used to impart knowledge amongst pupils. Post graduate students of MBA, MLD, M.Sc Agriculture, M.Sc IT are made part of the live projects. Leadership lessons from movies, attending

live session of legislative assembly, soft skills labs, workshop on innovative & creativity are being made a part of the new curriculum of PG courses.

12. Counselling & Placement Center: Dr Ganda Singh Career Guidance Counselling and Placement Centre of the college strives to open frontiers of knowledge and reveal new horizons of change. To enhance the employability of the students, various career agencies visit the college to conduct tests and interviews for placement. The cell continuously works on building relationship between the college and the corporate sector to strengthen industry-academia bond.

Special Remedial Classes are arranged for SC/ST, minority students and academically weak students.

- 13. Goodwill Cell: The institution is conscious of its social obligation and realizes the need to inculcate sensitivity towards social causes amongst our students. The cell engages in various fund raising activities to contribute towards various causes to help the underprivileged sections of the society or the people affected by natural calamities.
- 14. NSS and NCC: With primary focus on the development of personality of students through community service, the college offers 3 units (2 for boys & 1 for girls) of NSS approved by Punjabi University Patiala. The NCC (Army & Air Wing) aims at developing character, comradeship, discipline, a secular outlook, the spirit of adventure and ideals of selfless service amongst young students. Further, it aims at creating a pool of organized, trained and motivated youth with leadership qualities in all walks of life.
- 15. Women Empowerment: College believes in creating an environment where women can make independent decisions on their personal development as well as shine as equals in society. *Nanhi Chaan Cell* of the college is playing a significant role in creating a social awareness against injustice and marginalization of the females through various activities like seminars, drives and campaigns on the issues of gender inequality, female foeticide, education etc.

16. Foreign Tie-ups: In order to provide international exposure, SGPC has collaboration with the foreign universities to provide scholarship to students and teachers for the higher studies. Amandeep Kaur student of M. Sc Maths, GSSDGS Khalsa College Patiala has been awarded with 'Shiromini Gurudwara Prabandhak Committee Cambridge Scholarship' for Ph.D study at University of Cambridge UK, where half the fee of the course is borne by SGPC and the rest half by the coordinating institution. This college has also tied-up with WINTEC, New Zealand, Sheriden College, Canada and many other projects are in the pipeline.

7.3 BEST PRACTICES

Best Practice-I

- Title of the Practice: Developing Human Capital through Career Guidance, Counselling and Placement Centre.
- 2. **Objectives of the Centre:** The goal of the centre is to ensure the holistic development of the students to bridge the gap between the skills given and skills required in the employment market. More specifically, the following are the objectives of the centre:
 - To inculcate market oriented employability skills among the students.
 - To conduct skill development programmes
 - To conduct lectures on career guidance
 - To facilitate placements
 - To provide counselling to the students regarding career options,
 Managing stress, Building Self Confidence, and Self Motivation and creating Positive Attitude.
 - To organise remedial classes for SC/ST and students from weaker sections of the society.

- To conduct workshops, seminars, and other programmes for the overall development of the students, teaching and non-teaching staff.
- 3. The Context: While the Global Population is ageing rapidly, India, with one of the largest youngest populations in this world, is at a strategic advantage with regards to demographic dividend. Still, the growth rate of India is quite low as compared to the developed countries. The reason behind is the wide gap between the skills required in the Industry and the skills provided by the education system. The World Economic Forum's Global Talent Risk report (2011) cautions that developing countries like India and Brazil will face huge skill gaps due to the low employability. To bridge this gap between employment and employability, GSSDGS Khalsa College, Patiala has constituted Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance Counselling and Placement Centre.
- 4. **The Practice:** The Centre functions with the express purpose of making students employable, and then focusing on getting them placed in reputed Companies and Organizations. To impart employability skills to the students, the Centre is engaged in training them regularly on various modules that make them enter and then adapt to the organization. The training modules cover aptitude tests, group discussions, interview techniques, self-motivation, stress management and a host of other need based skills for the students. For the purpose, both in-house and professional external faculty is involved and the overall personality of the students is honed. The Centre strives to open frontiers of knowledge and reveal new horizons of change, to broaden mind sets and to create positive attitudes in the students by organizing lectures, workshops, seminars and group interactions. The students get a lot of industrial exposure through their frequent industrial visits. Special classes are arranged for SC/ST, minority students and all those students who require special attention. Workshops and Seminars are also held for the teaching and non-teaching staff to brush up their knowledge and skills.

- **5. Evidence of Success:** The following list of activities and achievements presents evidence of success achieved by the centre:
 - Mass Counselling Programme in association with district bureau of employment generation and training for various schemes.

2. Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance Counselling and Placement Centre

It was suggested by the Peer team to start coaching classes for various competitive exams. The college established Dr. Ganda Singh Career Guidance Counselling and Placement Centre in the college which conducts various programmes for competitive exams and also prepares the students for placement interviews. The centre also conducts classes for UGC-NET.

3. Hostel Facility

The college has constructed its own Girls Hostel in the area of 2 acres of land. It is a three story many magnificent building with many facilities. More than 230 girls

from many states of the country are putting in the hostel. The college has tied up with Govt. College i.e. State College of Education for the hostel facility to the male students of the college. Hence, the boys are staying in that hostel.

4. Strengthening of Science Labs

The Peer team suggested to strengthening the bio-technology lab. However, the college strengthens all the science labs with the ultra modern infrastructure and facilities. The students of science are also sent to industrial training project suggested by the Peer team. The science labs of the institution are now comparable with the best in the country.

5. Media Centre and Other Centres

The college has established a separate media centre in the college. The news coverage of the activities of the college is clearly visible from the file clipping. The college has also established University Grants Commission Network Report Centre and IQAC Cell.

6. Research Projects

The Peer team suggested that the teacher should be encouraged to apply for minor & major research projects of UGC and Other funding agencies. It is matter of pride that 27 of the faculty members have either completed or in the process of completion of their minor & major research projects and this number perhaps is the largest in the state in any one individual college. The governing body of the institution has established research fund to the time of Rs.10,00,000 (Rupees Ten Lacs only) p.a for its faculty members.

7. Library

The Peer team suggested that the library should be strengthened further and it should be computerized. It is a matter of great satisfaction that the library has more than 32,000 books and 65 journals and magazines. It is fully computerized. The receipt and issue of books is made electronically. Touch screens have been installed in the reading hall in order to help the students in locating the books

required by them. The library has also subscribed to the facility of e-database INFLIBNET.

8. Expansion of College Building

The college has added 35 class rooms and all the departments have been provided with the departmental rooms. Besides the college has established One Conference Hall, One Library Reading Hall, Board Room, Counseling Room and Cafeteria. The college has also built Gymnasium for the physical well being of the staff and students.

9. Teaching Aids and Devices

The committee suggested that the modern teaching devices should be used in the teaching. The college has added many smart class rooms to its infrastructure. They are fully equipped with last pedagogical requirement like LED projector and computer. Digital Visualizer and Interactive All in one projector are also added in the institution.

10. Self Evaluation

The self evaluation of the teacher has been adopted and they are asked to report their achievements and other details in the report. Their scores are verified by the college principal and on the basis of that they are given the report in ACR.

11. Alumini Association

The college has an active alumini association. Every year one major function of OSA is organized and 5 prominent old students of the college are awarded with College Ratan Award. Many famous and eminent personalities like famous Bollywood Actor Om Puri have been awarded with College Ratan Award. The alumini association also rendered help to the needy students. It meets twice or thrice in year.







PEER TEAM REPORT ON THE ASSESSMENT AND ACCREDITATION OF KHALSA COLLEGE, PATIALA

Section 1- Introduction

The Khalsa college, Badungar Road, Patiala volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) Bangalore. The institution submitted a Self-Study Report (SSR) to the NAAC in Dec., 2003. In response to this request, the NAAC constituted a peer team consisting of Prof. G. Nancharaiah, as Chairmen, Prof. D. K. Maheshwari and Dr. S. N. Singh as members. Prof. Maheshwari coordinated the peer team visit efficiently on Sept 19-20, 2005.

The Peer Team carefully went thorough and analysed the SSR prior to its visit. During its two day visit on site on Sept. 19-20, 2005 the team interacted extensively with the Management, Principal, faculty, non-teaching staff, students, parents and alumni to assess various academic and support services. The team evaluated, at length, co-curriculum, research and extension activities of the college and validated the SSR on the basis of relevant available information and documents. Based on the above exercise and keeping in mind the seven criteria identified by NAAC, the peer team has taken the value judgment of the institution criterion wise.

The college affiliated to Punjabi University was established in 1960. The college was taken over by Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC), Sri Amritsar in the year 1992. Hence its activities are now managed and controlled by SGPC. It has a campus of the total area of 18.5 acres. At the top of the college main building Gurudwara Sahib has also been built. It is a grant in aid private College. The aim of the college is to empower the educationally backward and disadvantaged rural population by imparting a liberal general education with special stress on ethical and human values. The college was recognized by the University Grant Commission (UGC) under 2f and 12B in July, 1960.

The college offers diverse courses in Arts, Science, Computers and Commerce along with professional and vocational courses. The college provide unique sports facilities. It is the only college in the city which offers various courses like computer application as a vocational subject in commerce stream and information technology in arts and science streams and computer maintenance in science stream. The college has a commendable record of achievements in sports at National and International level. The college, at present, has 1705 students on its rolls with 438 girl's students. Students from other states are 35. There are 253 students in self-financing courses in the college. There are 98 SC/ST students and 86 OBC students. The college has a well qualified teaching faculty with a strength of 65 members including 46 permanent and 19 part-time teachers. About 81 percent of the teaching load is shared by permanent teachers. There are 57 members of non-teaching staff which includes 37 ministerial staff and 20 technical staff. The teaching staff is recruited by selection committee comprising the President of Governing Body, Principal, University nominee and expert and DPI nominee in accordance with UGC/university qualification and norms. The college has a Central Library, Computer Centre, Health Centre, Audio-visual room, well-maintained Lawns, Botanical Garden, Playgrounds, T.T. Hall, and a Canteen.

The annual budget of the college in 2005-06 is Rs. 22270037/- and was utilized as per guidelines of the state government. The unit cost of education at this college is Rs. 13505/- per student per annum. The overall teacher student ratio is 1:40.

Section 2: Criterion - Wise Analysis

Criterion -I Curriculum Aspects

The college has combinations of 16 subjects in the stream of Arts. The college has graduation in Science, computer and commerce. In commerce stream job oriented optional subjects are available in finance and marketing. The college has started B.Sc. Biotechnology in session 2004-05 and MA course in Punjabi from 2005-06. There is a PG Diploma in computer Application in morning-evening shift. The college has well defined mission and objectives to provide education to the weaker and rural section

people of the society. The options of various subjects are available for the students at Undergraduate level in Science, Arts and Commerce, which are well defined in the college prospectus. College is providing special knowledge and skills to the students, through the courses of computer education and Information Technology. The ratio of knowledge to skills is 60:40. The courses are updated and reviewed by the Board of Studies of the University, to which the college is affiliated i.e. Punjabi University. The college introduced Vocational subjects on Computer Applications in 2001 and Computer Maintenance and Information Technology in 2002. The college has taken one more unit of PGDCA. Keeping in view the financial pattern of the State Government and to meet the changing requirements of the job market the college initiated 03 self financing courses and 03 vocational subjects. The college works within the syllabi and UG programme designed by the university and many of its teachers have been members of Board of studies and academic bodies of Punjabi University. They have played active role in the formulation or revision of the syllabus in the subjects of Physics, Political Science, Fine Arts and Folk Art and Culture and professional courses. The promotion policy for the staff is governed by the state government rules. However, academic performance is viewed by the college regarding the evaluation of their work. The college not only motivates students to achieve success in academics but also aims at overall personality development through value based education and inculcating moral and spiritual values among students by encouraging them to participate in various religious activities like Gurpurab, Nagar Kirtan, Shabad Gayan. This is only college in the city which is offering Religion as optional subject at undergraduate level. Special efforts are made to develop analytical ability through participation in competitions, quiz contests essay writing, debate and extra curricular activities.

Criterion II - Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

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The college admission for various courses is based on merit cum interview. After admission the students are assessed through class test, written assignments, group discussion and project work. Special assistance is given to weak students, students

belonging to Scheduled caste and economically weaker sections by providing them extra coaching in consultation periods and also taking remedial classes. Advance learners are motivated further by giving them fee concession and free books. They have facility of borrowing three books from the library. Students who excelled in sports are provided guidance by expert coaches in several area besides financial support for participating in University, State and National level meets. Merit certificate, prizes, cash awards are awarded to the top two positions on the basis of house exams at the annual function.

The syllabi are unitized on monthly basis even under annual system of examination at the beginning of academic session at the department level. The teachers give a proposed syllabi to the students for covering on regular and organised basis and other teaching activities. The senior most teacher of the department periodically reviews the completion of the syllabus.

The college has a number of measures of interactive learning such as group discussion, seminars, presentations, workshops, industrial visits, assignments, study tours and exhibitions. The facility of audio visual aids such as OHP, slide projectors, chart, models etc. are also available for the students. Students are also given an opportunity to visit historical places, botanical gardens a tourist places. College has 284 working days and 180 teaching days. The workload of each teacher per week is allocated as per the norms of UGC and University i.e. 24 lectures per week

The ratio of the teaching to non-teaching staff is 1.25:1 and full time teachers to part time is 2.42:1. Evaluation methods are conveyed to students in the beginning of the session. The students are informed well in time for the evaluation of their performance through class tests and house examinations. In Dec. and Feb., the college holds exams to assess the overall performance of the students. The permanent posts of the staff are filled as per UGC guidelines by managing committee. The selection committee through the college has also been given authority to recruit teaching staff on part time basis. The Committee comprises of Principal, Management nominee, University nominee subject expert and DPI nominee. In many of subjects college has secured 100% results.

Teachers are encouraged to participate in National and International seminars. Of the teachers 24 have participated at National and state level seminars, conferences and workshops and 02 at international level seminar. Eight teachers have been awarded for their academic achievements. Two faculty members have been resource persons at National level seminars. Eleven teachers have contributed 25 books. Teachers performance is evaluated through self appraisal proforma for promotion and for higher grade as per DPI norms. The college has also conducted seminar, conference etc. One of faculty invited to deliver subject lectures. It is commendable that one faculty member from Physics Department has been awarded by State Language Deptt. for writings a book establishing relationship between religious scripture and science. 3 faculty members have been given award of honour by affiliating university for contribution in cultural activities. 8 of the students have got positions in university merit list during last five years.

Criterion III - Research Consultancy and Extension

The college has 46 permanent teachers. Out of these teachers, 26 are female and 20 are male teachers. Out of the permanent teachers, 17 are Ph.D, 09 are M.Phil, 19 are having Masters Degree and one is having Bachelor of Engineering degree. Out of 19 part time teachers, 4 are Ph.D, 1 M.Phil, 10 having Master Degree, 4 having Bachelor of Engineering degree.

For the promotion of the research, study leave is granted by the Government. Teachers are also provided with seed money for carrying research. Teachers are also encouraged to pursue research under UGC sponsored projects. The college has given a special attention towards the extension activities such as health and hygiene awareness, AIDS awareness, blood donation camp etc. College awards Roll of honour, college colour and Merit certificate to students who excelled in Quiz, Talent hunt and other similar activities. Such students can avail fee concessions. There is an extensive tree plantation with the support of State Bank of Patiala. Some of the college teachers have excelled by contributing substantially at regional, national and even international level in their respective fields.

The college has designated a faculty member for extension and placement activities. Extension activities are undertaken through various clubs societies N.C.C., NSS. The college has a NSS wing comprising three units, N.C.C. Army and Air wing

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which is regularly helping the community in various ways such as by providing medical check up and organizing camps for cleanliness. Two NCC cadets have participated in Republic Day Parade in the year 2003. The career guidance cell guides the students in the choice of career and enlighten the students about employment avenues and their placement. The student Ms. Jaspreet Kaur participated in international folk music and dance festival in THE RANGE OF LAKES in Russia in year 2003. The students have participated in cultural programme held at Thailand, Malaysia, Dubai, and some other countries. The college has been overall champion in youth festivals in 2 years at university level. The students have won laurels at National level in Bhangra (Folk dance), Gazal. The college Bhangra team and Group Shabad team have been winners at inter-varsity level. Two of the students have got 3 Gold Medals in Bhangra in last 2 years. Many of the students have got employment on the basis of cultural activities like Bhangra and Music. In last two year the student of college have won Gold Medal in Group skit, Silver in Clay modeling and non-percussion.

Criterion IV - Infrastructure and Learning Process

The college has adequate class rooms, well maintained and fully equipped Hardware and Software computer laboratories, staff room, administrative block, girls common room, audio-visual room and career guidance cell. The college has 2 power gensets, 3 water coolers. The college has adequate parking area for the staff and students. The full time campus caretaker undertakes the maintenance of the infrastructure and experts from sports department maintain the play ground For the development of the infrastructure, UGC grants, state fundings and funds from SGPC are made available. The central computer facility is also available, which remains open for 300 days in a year having 60 computers in the college. The computers are interconnected by Local Area Network, the college has 128 kbps leased line (sify) for fast internet access. Efforts are being made to set up Network Resource Centre with the support of U.G.C. Latest peripherals like Bluetooth, Pen Drives, Scanner and Webcam are being used in labs. The Department of Computer Science has departmental library stocked with 461 books (202

titles). The college is also planning to generate funds to meet the increasing demand of infrastructure. College has an 'Infrastructure committee', which looks after the infrastructure of the college. College is also offering its infrastructure and campus to the outside agencies such as Punjab State Electricity Board, Banks, Sports etc. To keep the campus clean and beautiful a 'Beautification Committee' is constituted. N.S.S. volunteers also help to maintain grounds. Dustbins are provided at various points. Similarly, there is Library Advisory Committee helping for the smooth functioning of the college library. The main library has a Book Bank also. Library is partially computerised, efforts are being made for full computerisation. The library has 23673 books. During the session 2003-04 and 2004-05, 597 and 2673 more books were added to the library respectively. 74 magazines/journals and 16 news papers have a regular entry in the library. The library has the facility like reading room, research cell, text book section, journal section and book bank. Library is functioning for 284 days in a year and 8hrs per day (9:00am to 5:00pm) in working hours and off hours. Entire faculty of the college can access computer facilities. Administrative block and library have the facility of computer. Keeping in view the requirement of the students, more computers need to be added. The engineers of the computer firms look after the maintenance of the computer and so its related aspects. College has facility of health services having dispensary and qualified doctor. The college has infrastructure for sports and physical education centre. Play grounds of volley ball, Hockey, Cricket, Lawn tennis, Athletics track, Foot ball, soft ball, kabaddi, basket ball, hand balls (grassy and cemented) and stadium are available. The indoor games facilities for chess, carom and weight lifting exist for boys and girls separately etc. Special incentives are also given to the outstanding sports persons. In session 2002-03 The college has won 4 medals in international participation of which 2 are Gold and 1 is Silver and 20 medals at national level of which 3 are Gold, 11 are Silver. Handball and Lawn Tennis team of college have won 1st position at inter college level and At regional and state level, college students have won 14 and 30 medals respectively. During 2002-03, college has won 21 medals at All India Inter Univ. and at Junior National level. The Hockey team of the college was runner up in Nehru cup and Punjab league college championships for the year 2004. During session 2003-04 college had one Gold at International level and 18 Golds, 7 Silver and 1 Bronze at National level to its credit. In team games the college got 1st position in Handball and Hockey at intercollege level 3rd position in volleyball (boys and girls) at inter-college level. During session 2004-05 the college had a credit of 1 Gold, 4 Silver and 2 Bronze medals at International level and 14 Gold, 17 Silver and 4 Bronze at National level. In the same session at inter college level the student of college got 1st position in Handball, Badminton, Lawn Tennis, Volleyball, Hockey, fencing and cycling. The college also secured overall 2nd position in inter-college competition of University. During current session the college has got 13 Golds 3 Silvers and 5 Bronze at inter college level. The college got 1st position in Judo (Men and Women) and Boxing at inter-college level and also got 3rd position in baseball (Men). The college has various clubs and associations which undertake a number of social activities.

Criterion V - Student support and progression

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The college is doing quite well in academics. The drop out rate is 12.86%. Students of BCA figured in the merit list of the University Examination. Most of the courses are skill based, after passing the course students setup their own business. The college keeps prospective students informed of the opportunities available in the college of the academic pursuits through an updated prospectus annually before admission starts. The prospectus includes information regarding admission process, fee structure, eligibility conditions, rules, information related to extension activities, support services available, fee concessions, scholarships and prizes, faculty members, academic calendar etc.. The college offers liberal scholarships and fee concessions to the deserving students on the basis of their achievements in academic, cultural and sports activities. The students also get State/National scholarships.

A placement cell has been established to provide counseling, seminars, establish contacts with organisations for on campus interviews. The placement cell has been successful in placing students in various organisations. The college encourages self employment by imparting them professional knowledge and training.

The college provides financial assistance to poor and orphan students. The financial help has been substantially increased in the following year. Students aid fund and PTA funds are utilized for needy students. The career guidance cell is there for

academic and personal counseling to all students. The students magazine publication in 'The Patiala' is a annual feature. Computonics club also publishes a news letter highlighting the achievements and literary work of its members. Students participation is sought while publishing the magazine. Old students Association has been constituted from 2003-04. College has bank facility in its premises. Each academic session begins by holding of the Akhand path. Student celebrates Gurpurab and enjoys langer (Community Kitchen) preparation. The feed back Performa filled up by students keep informed about shortcomings so as to get necessary action. The college provides support to students in form of educational leisure time facilities to indoor and outdoor games, audio-visual room, creative writing, clay modeling, painting, drawing, music, debates and declamation contests. The college organises "Talent Hunt" every year to expose the hidden talents of students.

Criterion VI - Organisation and Management

The college was setup in the year 1960 by the Khalsa College Trust, Patiala. In 1992 Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC) Sri Amritsar took over the management of the college. Its commitments to education are reflected in the goals of the institution. The college has a local management committee comprising of eminent persons with academic orientations. Management consists of honorary workers who give their time and talents in good measure. The policy of management is to ensure freedom for educational institutes under its jurisdiction, to innovate, raise resources and to plan for their brighter future. The staff members are given aid in terms of loan facility. Securing help to needy and deserving students is laudable culture of the college. The Principal of college has leading role in the development activities by coordinating with the Governing Body and the Khalsa College Trust.

The day-to-day administration is looked after by the Principal with the help of deans and coordinators of various departments. In addition, various committees have also been constituted for smooth functioning of the college. Various associations and clubs have been formed to supervise extra curricular activities. College Development Council, Registrar House Exams, Time Table Incharge and Heads of departments coordinate to

prepare academic calendar. The Principal regularly monitors its implementations and interacts with staff in meetings with HODs, College Development Council and members of teaching and non teaching staff. The college has proposal to computerize the office administration, fee collection and accounts department. The college has two grievance redressal cells, one for students taken care by faculty members and another for staff headed by the Secretary, Local Managing Committee.

The bursar of the college who happens to be member of teaching faculty supervises the college account regularly. Accountant General Punjab and Deputy Controller Financial & Accounts, Internal Audit Institution, Finance Department, Punjab have audited the accounts of the college till 2003-04. The auditing of accounts are conducted by SGPC, the Governing Body of the college. Loans are available to staff out of their provident funds.

The Principal through office superintendent monitors administrative staff. Technical staff is supervised by the Principal with the help of HODs. College has cleanliness committee to have check on gardeners and sweepers. The fee structure is decided by the Governing Body as per the norms of the University.

Criterion VII- Healthy Practices

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The college gets in formal feedback from students on feedback proforma relating to classroom teaching, facilities offered, co-operation of teaching and non-teaching staff etc. and their suggestions for improvement in college in form of suggestion boxe fixed at different places in the college campus. The college looks to sensitized towards strategic planning as previous plans have been found executed. The college has the credit of career oriented UGC sponsored vocational subjects and self financing courses which are as per the goals of institution to provide gainful employment to students.

The college imparts value based education by starting the day with Shabad Kirtan (devotional music) or Patriotic songs. The college works for the over all development of its students. Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Gurmat society, Punjabi, Hindi and English Literary Societies etc. inculcate moral values among students. Gurmat Society celebrate Gurpurab every year and all the students partake the Guru Ka Langar (Community Kitchen). Poetry, Quiz and short story competitions are also held to

encourage creative talents of students. The parents and teacher co-ordinate for holistic welfare of students. NSS and NCC activities, cleanliness drives, tree plantation, blood donations camps inculcates civic responsibilities among students. Number of students are engaged in sports, cultural and other co-curricular activities oriented towards overall personality development of students. Thus driving away the students from drugs abuse disorientation. The college provides subsidised education to a good number of rural students.

Writing in college magazines, debates, declamation, journals like mathematics today and other journals for competitive exams, quiz contest and use of computers are there to promote the general/transferable skills among the students. The students of various department have visited Trade fair and Arts galleries. An employee of college has been honoured for his bravery by the district administration for the saving the life of 3 people from Bhakra Canal.

Keeping in view of the future growth and development of college the peer team suggest the following to the institution.

- The college may consider the introduction of more job oriented and selffinancing courses such as Military Science, Bachelor of Physical Education at UG level.
- > Coaching classes for various competitive exams may be started.
- Hostel facility may be provided to the students coming from the remote areas on the campus.
- > Department of Biotechnology is required to be strengthened in terms of instrumentation and library and its students should be encouraged to go for summer training in Industry.
- Efforts may be made to strengthen the mass media centre in the college.
- Faculty members should be encouraged to submit the major and minor research project to different funding agencies such as UGC, ICSSR, DBT etc.
 - College may encourage to provide seed money for research.
- Library should be strenghtened further by allocating more funds. Steps should be taken to computerise the library completely.

- > The expansion of college building requires to be taken up so that adequte space can be provided to the department.
- Self evalution of teachers may be adopted .
- Efforts may be made to use modern devices such as LCD etc. during teaching.
- Alumni association may be activised.

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
